## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

We consider this an opportunity to present Self-Study Report as a testimony to our efforts that we undertook after the second cycle of accreditation. It assures, as promised in the vision and mission statement of the institution, commitment to excellence and quality in particular and 'taking masses from darkness to light' in general. In the 55<sup>th</sup> year of its establishment, we find ourselves as an institution in the form of Deogiri College reached out almost every nook and corner of the society in the region by establishing high standards of quality and performance. The introspection of our policies and 'ways of doing' brings about many ideas to recognize potentials we possess to stretch further the capabilities in the process of quality enhancement and innovations. Our reaccreditation by NAAC with CGPA of 3.39 strengthened our confidence to excel in the field of higher education. It however brought responsibility to each stakeholder of the college to function collectively in order to achieve all round development of the institution. As a result, it has become an experience for each of us to realize that transformation of knowledge and information should be accompanied by integrated efforts by each component involved in the process of teaching and learning.

Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal established its first branch in the form of Deogiri College in 1960. The *mandal* was established by great visionaries like late Vinayakrao Patil an ideal teacher, to offer education to masses from rural areas and to the economically backward classes. The college from its inception has been a key factor in bringing about transformation in region through education. The college runs 12 U.G, 22 P.G., 02 COP programmes, 01 PG Diploma, 01 UG Diploma, 18 Short Term Certificate Courses and 10 University Recognized Ph. D Research Centres. However, Ph. D research guides are available in 13 subjects. In the academic year 2014-15, overall 6798 students took education in the college.

What lies in efficacy of the institute is its well structured mechanism operated on the most micro level to identify the changes in times and realize the need for advancement. Its credit also lies in the visionary representation on the management. The management of the institution is represented by the various experts hailing from different walk of society. Most of them are very successful diplomats and visionary leaders who made outstanding difference with their presence as an important authority in government of Maharashtra. Their presence in the management does make a constant provision for unending and ever encouraging support for quality assurance and sustenance.

The institution received an award as an **Outstanding Institution by Government of Maharashtra in 2001.** It also received an award with cash prize of one lakh in 2012 by Government of Maharashtra for its notable efforts made under '*Jagar Janiwancha*' an initiative by Government of Maharashtra to spread awareness against female feticide, embarked upon. The government of Maharashtra honoured the efforts on the



college executed through various activities under the title. It is being run as a movement at the college level. In 2010, the college hosted a program celebrating **Golden Jubilee Year** of establishment of M.S.P. Mandal. It was inaugurated by the then President of India Her Excellency Smt. Pratibhatai Patil. College also hosted programmes like **All India Marathi Literary Meet in 2011**. The college had privilige of organizing a programme entitled *Shodh Marathi Manacha* (Discovering Marathi Mind) in 2011. Marathi people working as successful entrepreneurs, businessmen, politicians, social workers, artists, critics, journalists, etc were invited from different parts of the world. It proved an essential event that contributed in bringing about the idea of unity among Marathi people spread all over the world and interactions of the people with college students and staff were fruitful. The college is also honoured by the affiliating university by conferring the college with **Best Examination Centre Award** twice in the last five years for excellent conduct of University examinations.

**IQAC & Post Accreditation Initiatives:** The cycle of accreditation by NAAC mark a vivid phase in development of the institution. Since the time of establishment of IQAC, it has emerged as an important body that functions as a catalyst for many processes pertaining to quality sustenance and enhancement. It is IQAC that binds various activities of the institute in a thread that passes through bearing institution's vision and mission. IQAC has paid attention to every quality issue as suggested by NAAC and essential for betterment of teaching-learning process. The recommendations made by NAAC peer team are treated with priority by IQAC. The college has come up with many new initiatives after the second cycle of accreditation besides fulfilling recommendations by the team. The college has contributed in good deal for social cause and initiated its efforts to support for the people suffering from drought condition in the region. It contributed very positively to social movements through its various activities. Initiatives of the college on academic and management level have been promising. Enhancement of both the resources, human and infrastructural has been treated equally with creation of new resources keeping in view the changes on various levels. However, the college has predominantly considered achievement by students as a testimony to the true success of the institution.

The college is committed to provide quality education to every section of the society and realizes the execution of its quality policy through the success of its stakeholders. Following are few of the key issues that highlight the growth of the college as a fullyfledged educational institute.

• Career Advancement & Professional Development: The college has made it a prominent policy seeking career advancement of both the staff and students in a certain well defined manner. It believes in constant nurturing of qualities of human resources available on the campus through orientations, trainings and workshops organized by college for teaching, library, administrative, clerical staff



and lab attendants. Appointment of special training and placement officer in Career Guidance and Training & Placement Cell has been a very positive idea resulting in regularization and increase in placement activities.

- Contributing to Social Cause: The college has established its image as an institution possessing empathy for sufferings of masses. Its efforts and contribution in various social movements have been appreciated. The staff of college has been on its toes to contribute to social cause. The region in which the college is situated is prone to drought conditions. The conditions of certain part in the region worsen during summer due to lack of water. College has taken special efforts for such villages to provide them with water supply and necessary development. The streamlining of the events, works and activities of NSS, NCC, Department of Music, Department of Dramatics and the College library has resulted into meaningful services to various sections of society.
- **Inclusive Strategies and Value Orientation:** The college has diversity of students and it offers equity to each stakeholder. Besides, the functioning of various committees on certain issues, the work culture on the campus become an encouraging way to enhance core values among students. The renowned 25 years old lecture series like *Phule-Shahu-Ambedakar Lecture Series* addresses to many themes pertaining to social issues and development of society in general. Services to physically challenged students, activities of Equal Opportunity Centre and Women Empowerment Cell ensure justice to various stakeholders of the college.
- Centre for Excellence and "Leading by Example": UGC conferred the status of 'College with Potential for Excellence' in 2010. It has resulted in encouraging all staff and students to equip themselves for higher levels of excellence. The development of infrastructure and IT and their fine inclusion in teaching-learning process has become a key issue in advancement of learning on the campus. Deogiri College being the most prominent institute not only under M.S.P. Mandal but also among the affiliated colleges under Dr. B. A. M. University, Aurangabad, bears the responsibility to present itself as an example of excellence thus 'leading by example'.
- Going Green: The College recognizes importance of environmental awareness. The activities of the Department of Zoology, Botany, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Geology, NSS, NCC and Eco Club undertake various initiatives pertaining to plantation of trees, rain water harvesting, waste management, recharging bore wells and dug wells, recycling of used water and use of renewable energy. Meteorological station, water recycling unit, rain water harvesting unit and mechanism for recharging the bore wells on the campus are more appreciated efforts of the college.

Achievements of our students in sports, games, cultural activities, NCC and NSS activities have been promising. We believe we have taken enough efforts as to provide every stakeholder of the institution with opportunities to grow in a balanced form. Following is the gist of our contemplation over our achievement against the backdrop of the seven criteria envisaged by NAAC.



#### **Curriculum Planning:**

- To ensure the need-based development, the college provides more programme options, flexibility and wide choice for students.
- Curriculum has evolved in various aspects as to meet the needs of time and equip the learners with latest and practical knowledge of subjects.
- Regular organization of seminars, orientation programs & workshops on new syllabi, revision in syllabi, new teaching methods, use of ICT in teaching & learning, etc.
- Establishment of Academic Council to formalize the work of courses to be offered by the college.
- Curriculum design and planning for 17 certificate courses under Career Development Programme.
- College teachers represent themselves on BoS in the affiliating University and have made positive impact in the work of curriculum planning, designing and up-grading.
- Cosultation with industry experts, academicians, employers, alumni and other stakeholders is sought in order enrich the curricula being taught.
- While designing curriculum for B.Voc programmes, college teachers received more freedom to design most relevant curriculum in order to make the programmes employment oriented.

#### **Teaching - Learning & Evaluation:**

- Teachers play the role of facilitators in learning process.
- College has introduced need-based certificate courses for skill development.
- Introduction of 17 short term certificate courses under Career Development Programme.
- Inclusion of ICT is sought to make teaching-learning process more effective and meaningful.
- More resources are sought from industries, market and workshops for imparting the practical knowledge of the world to students especially for the students enrolled for B.Voc programmes.
- Teaching-learning process is accompanied by attitude, aptitude and personality development through the various programmes organized by Career Counselling and Placement Cell.
- Orientation of teachers is regularly done in order to make them more efficient in making use of modern technological aids in their teaching.
- Field visits, study tours, programmes like lecture series on entrepreneurship development have become a persistent part of teaching-learning process.
- Gandhi Study Centre, Apex Career Academy, History and Geology Museum functions as supporting information centres to equip students with knowledge of various aspects like career, human values, etc.



• Thrust has been given to learner-centric teaching plans, continuous up-gradation of teacher quality, transparent examination system.

#### **Research, Consultancy & Extension:**

- Availability of 10 University recognized Ph. D. Research Centres and Ph.D guides are available in 13 subjects.
- Research, consultancy and extension activities have been strengthened.
- MoUs with many institutes from within and outside of the country have resulted in quality publication and accomplishment of research projects funded by UGC, DST, etc.
- Teachers have received more than 1.3 crore rupees as research grants from UGC and other funding agencies to carry out work of their research projects during the last four years.
- College has established a Central Research Laboratory to facilitate interdepartmental and inter-disciplinary research work.
- College constantly encourages its faculty for participation in various conferences, workshops, seminars, etc and also provides financial support for such participation.
- Consultancy is provided by offering analyses of the samples received from various industries and institutes in the Central Research Laboratory. Besides it, Department of Geology, Department of Psychology provides consultancy on various related issues like dug well, bore well site selection, water and rock analyses, TB drop out counseling, etc.
- College provides financial help to drought affected area in the region of Marathwada; it adopts village taking responsibility to provide necessary infrastructure for provision of water.
- NSS and NCC units regularly undertake various programmes like blood donation camps, cleanliness programmes, tree plantation programmes, participation in different rallies, etc.
- College library provides its services to Old People's Home named Matoshri and also has donated its books to need institutes and public libraries.

#### **Infrastructure & Learning Resources:**

- The college has total campus area of 10.32 acres including built up area of 23049 sq mt.
- The college has a well developed library consisting of 113324 books and its first floor is a reading hall for students.
- The college has two boys' hostels and three girls' hostels accommodating 1057 students.
- The campus houses science laboratories, modern classrooms, library, NCC and NSS rooms, ladies common rooms, seminar halls, a well constructed auditorium, a conference hall and two canteens.
- Infrastructure for sports consists of gymnasium, sports hall, sports ground.



- 22 classrooms are ICT enabled.
- There are four research laboratories in addition to the Central Research Laboratory.
- The college has well developed playground with size of 100X113 M. The availability of the ground enables to organize various sports and cultural events at college and university level.
- A regular doctor is appointed at the Health Centre of the college.
- The college has remarkably high computer student ratio, with LAN facilities, 10 mbps internet and WiFi facility to access repository of the college.
- The college has 22 well equipped laboratories, 04 computer laboratories and an advanced language laboratory.
- The Department of History and Department of Geology have museums with good number of artifacts.
- The college has a rainwater harvesting project, a water recycling project, recharging of bore well mechanism and water purifying plan are at place.
- The Department of Sports & Physical Education and Girls' Hostel have well equipped gymnasium.

#### Governance, Leadership & Management:

- Academic Council looks after various issues related to curriculum designing and its implementation.
- Participatory administration in planning, execution and monitoring.
- Farsighted management encouraging the human resources to put in maximum efforts.
- Decentralization of authority and partial autonomy is provided to departments to take initiatives in decision making.
- Three tier system of management system aiming at optimum outcome from various practices and events.
- An effective feedback system is at place seeking feedback on various aspects.
- Appraisal of teachers' performance is done regularly.
- Long term perspective planning is done in order to achieve certain qualitative ends and benchmarking is done along with short term planning of its achievement.
- Teachers are encouraged to participate in corporate life and represent themselves on various academic and public bodies by the management.
- A good number of teachers of the college are members of Board of Study in their subject.
- Coordination Committee, HoDs and coordinators and chairpersons of various committees and cells bring about coordination in order to achieve successful culmination of various practices and programmes.



#### **Student Support & Progression:**

- The college provides financial assistance to sports students, wards of staff, physically challenged students, students participating in cultural activities, economically backward students in the form of freeship, concession and cash prizes as well.
- The college has developed learning friendly ambience in college campus.
- Infrastructural developments and creation of facilities are sought by considering the requirements of students.
- Debate and elocution competitions are organized every year in the memory of the founder of M.S.P. Mandal, Aurangabad, Late Shri Vinayakraoji Patil.
- 2653 students qualified in various state and central govt. exams, NET/SET, banking, army, DRDO, etc.
- 473 students are selected in campus interviews organized at the college campus since 2011.
- 33 students received ranks at University exams in the last four years.
- 448 medals are bagged by the college students in the last four years in various university, state and national level events of sports and games.
- 219 awards and prizes are won by students of Department of Dramatics and Music in the last four years in various University, state and national level cultural competitions.
- 76 awards in elocution and debate competitions are bagged by four students of the college in last two years.
- 174 students passed B and C certificate exam during the last four years.
- 10 cadets and volunteers of NSS and NCC joined RDC, BLD and TLC parade in the last four years.

#### **Innovations & Best Practices:**

- Deogiri College has nurtured an ambience of innovations on the college campus.
- Green Audit is done on various issues like water, waste management, energy, pollution, trees and plants.
- A separate Training and Placement Officer (TPO) is appointed to look after the process of campus interviews and training for it.
- Feeders and water pots are set in the premises of college campus for birds.
- Department of Dramatics at Deogiri College has ventured into making of a short film named SHIRAMI. It is based on a true story occurred in West Bengal about Khap Panchayat which punishes a girl from backward classe. Writing, direction, production for the film was done by Mr. Anil Salve, Head, Department of Dramatics. Students of the department acted in the film. It received two awards on national and international level.



- Dept. of Computer Science and IT has developed user-friendly software to manage information about various academic activities and personal academic record of teaching staff.
- The Department of Psychology has been providing psychological counselling and has been offering psychological orientation to industry, school students and teachers from various schools.
- Introduction of 17 certificate courses under Career Development Programme.
- College library also extends help to Old People's Home named *MATOSHRI* by providing books to the inmates of the home. The staff of the library carries books to them and offers them the books. This activity has been appreciated by the old people.
- College library gives best reader award to student by conducting an exam testing general knowledge of students.
- The college organized a special training event entitled Motivational Bridge Course in Mathematical Methods in Physics and Laboratory Practices. It was organized by the Department of Physics for I and II year B.Sc students in association with Indian Association of Physics Teachers RC-8 during 15th June to 9th July, 2011. It was sponsored by Indian Academy of Sciences (IAS), Bagalore, Indian Science Academy (INSA), New Delhi, National Academy of Sciences, India (NASI), Allahabad.
- The Department of History and Geology have museums. The museum at the Dept. of History consists of unique and special pieces of artefacts and the museum at the Dept. of Geology has systematically preserved various specimens of gems, stones and rocks.
- A special centre named Apex Career Academy for the guidance of competitive exams, like MPSC, UPSC and banking. It offers guidance to the college students on MPSC, UPSC and Banking exams. It frequently arranges free seminars on various issues related to the exams at college.
- Commencement of degree course like Bachelor of Vocation in Jewellery Designing & Gemology and Multimedia and Animation has been an outstanding academic innovation on the part of the college. The course approved by UGC bears the innovative features like academic flexibility where students have option to opt for career and it is not necessary to complete the course if the student desires to go for a job.
- College has established a Health Centre with a regular doctor Mrs Vaijayanti Damodar Bankar (Ubale). The doctor is available in the centre from 9.00am to 1.00 pm. She also makes visits to Girls' Hostel on a Sunday in every month. Students from Girls'& Boys' hostels, teaching and non-teaching staff at college make use of the services.
- College hostels use solar panels for heating water thus reduce pressure on electricity. There are 24 solar panels with total capacity of 19,000 litres used for water heating in Girls' and Boys' hostels. It has resulted in reducing the pressure on electricity usage.



- NSS unit organizes cleanliness programs for the Central Bus Station and Government Hospital. Three hundred volunteers take part in this activity every year.
- A Waste Water Treatment Plant for recycling of waste water is constructed on the area between girls' hostels and Biotechnology building.
- The region in which Deogiri College is situated suffers from drought conditions frequently. Frequent conditions of scarcity of water compels for best management of available water. As a result, Rain Water Harvesting unit is in function in college harvesting 20000000 litre of water every year.
- Consultancy services by the Department of Geology are carried out regularly. Prof. Ashok Tejankar offers consultancy services like selection of site for dugwell and borewell for irrigation and drinking purposes, consultancy for structure of the basement of engineering projects for multinational companies, watershed development programme, core logging for bridge and engineering sites, water analyses services for safer drinking water, preparing Contour, DEM, Lineament & Geology map of watershed and identification of gemstones.
- Exhibition and Demonstration of Science Experiments for School Students
- Phule–Shahu–Ambedkar Lecture Series
- Programmes under Jagar Janivancha.

#### 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

- There is a Feedback Analysis Committee that accumulates all feedback and analyse it systematically. The committee designs the feedback forms by taking into consideration the various aspects. The feedback is collected from students by random sampling method.
- The committee analyses the feedback and prepares a report. The conclusions and recommendations are communicated to University through the members of BoS working in our college. The feedback received on curriculm is also considered while designing new short term courses and implementation of University curricula.
- Teachers also send the new curricula to experts from various industries and academicians from different universities and receive feedback in hard copy format and online as well.
- College invites various companies that oranize events of campus placement for students. The companies like WNS –Glonerana, Hydrabad, WIPRO, Pune, IBM Global Process Services, Samarth Group, Aurangabad, Syntel Co. Ltd., Tata Motor Finance Ltd., Infosys Co. Ltd., Thyrocare Pvt. Ltd, Grainotech Industries Ltd, Accel Frontline Co.and Mahindra Tech are consulted about proper skill and professional development among students. #### **Rationale:**

#### M.Sc. Mathematics:

The application of Mathematics to all branches of science is well known and it has increased many-fold during the last few decades. Knowledge of Mathematics is, therefore, imperative for carrying out research and it forms a necessary input for industrial and technological development of the country. Therefore, in order to cultivate a mathematical attitude and nurture the interests among students and to motivate them for research, the college offers course in Mathematics at post-graduate level.



#### M.Sc. Geology:

The Department of Geology of the College with its pursuit for excellence runs academic programmes to cater to the needs of the geological organizations, industries, research institutes, academic institutes and the society at large. The Department is passing through a phase of transition, transition in consonance with the changing times. Such phases play very crucial role in the future developments. As the horizon of Geology expanded into the sphere of Earth Systems Science, the Department has started the process of incorporating the newer disciplines in its academic curriculum. Therefore, in order to maintain a balance between the fundamental disciplines and the newer branches to equip the students with the necessary skills to match the newer, more stringent requirements of the academia and the highly competitive job-market, the Department initiated M.Sc. in Geology.

#### Bachelor of Vocational Courses

#### Jewellery Design and Gemology :

The present course aims at imparting and inculcating the required skills among those interested through highly professional trainers encompassing both reputed academic institutes and Industries. With India standing as a strategic market for gems and jewelleries, more and more multinational companies are foraying into the lucrative space and there is growing demand for educated skilled craftsmen. The present course is aimed at bridging this significant gap and thus provides a good opportunity to those already in this industry and for those freshers who aspire to make career in this sector.

#### Multimedia and Animation:

Animation and Multimedia is a fast-emerging, high-paying career option today. Both animation and multimedia have attained importance and popularity in various professional fields such as Education, Advertising, Medicine, Military, Entertainment, Aviation, Information Technology, Banking, Business, Aeronautics, etc. Full length animation movies are in great demand now. A single animation film requires as many as 300 animators, which means huge employment opportunities. To step into this field, creativity is mandatory. Keeping that in mind, the college has initiated the course to nurture, enhance and guide students to bring their best creativity to a fruitful result.

#### **B.A. Sanskrit:**

The College initiated B.A. in Sanskrit in view of its importance from the point of view of educating the students about the ancient culture and heritage of our country and national integrity. Sanskrit has a rich tradition of kavya, drama and criticism. The course is intended to provide a general awareness on them. The course also aims to make an awarness of Sanskrit Literature as a classical poetic tradition.

#### 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

## 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

#### Publicity in admission process:

- Advertisements on admission to UG, PG, Diploma and Certificate Courses programmes are published in the leading regional newspapers
- Elaborate guidelines on admission and courses offered are available on the college website :<u>www.deogiricollege.org</u>
- Students can apply online and offline for admission by filling in the online form available on the website.
- An up-dated prospectus is issued along with the application forms for admission. This contains the details of programmes offered, eligibility and procedure for admission to different programmes, learning resources, hostel and other facilities, fee-structure and scholarships available to students.
- Exhaustive and immediate email, counseling and contact phone help desk facility is available
- The College follows the admission criteria and process set by the DrBabasahebAmbedkarMarathwada University, Aurangabad and Government of Maharashtra.
- The institution has created an impact on the society through its rich tradition. The management, faculty members, parents, alumni, students, and wellwishers serve as ambassadors of the institution effectively facilitating its publicity

#### Access and transparency:

The university has laid down norms of eligibility for admissions to various courses. The college strictly adheres to those norms. The Government of Maharashtra has its rules of reservation for admissions. These rules are conveyed to students. The college also maintains reservation criterion method as per govt norms.

- Admission schedule is declared immediately after results.
- The college declares seats available for different courses.
- No students are denied admissions if the seats are vacant.
- Announcement of merit list of applicants who have qualified through entrance examination is produced on the website of the college.
- Selection of students depends on demands and needs of the society.



- The college keeps transparency in admission process.
- Admitting students this way the college gets students of high percentage by displaying merit lists of selected students on notice boards.
- The on-line system of admission accounts for easy access and total transparency. Different branches of Axis Bank from Aurangabad accept the application fee required for the submission of on-line forms. This system enables students to have easy access to admission.
- Details of all the applicants as given in their application forms are computerized and categorized community-wise on the basis of subject and marks in the college office.
- A Centralised Admission Committee provides detailed information to parents / students seeking admission in this Institute.

#### **Equity:**

- Equity is provided through the adherence to the governmental reservation norms
- The College has also internalized the practice of social reservation, financial incentives and welfare measures. Accordingly, the college has implemented suitable supporting steps and facilities for the benefit of students.

# 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programs of the Institution.

#### The process of admission:

- The college has developed an on-line system of admission that consists of On-line availability of admission brochure, on-line submission of forms.
- Students can also access the form from the university website, fill it up and submit it online
- The admission fees can also be paid online through credit card or online transfer or through demand draft . This facility is available for both UG & PG programs.
- All admissions are computerized. Students are provided Permanent Registration Number (PRN) for further use.
- Necessary documents like eligibility certificate, migration certificate, E.B.C. forms are collected.
- All admissions are given on provisional basis subject to verification of documents and eligibility from university. The Principal reserves the rights of final admission and can cancel admission any time after verification.
- Students are instructed to preserve all college receipts without which no fees is refunded.



- Identity Card is issued soon after admission.
- List of the students admitted, is displayed on notice boards

#### **Admission Criterion:**

#### Traditional Courses: B.A. / B. Com./ B. Sc. /M.A./ M.Com./ M.Sc.

- The admission criteria adopted is primarily based on the merit achieved in the qualifying exam as prescribed by the Affiliating University and also for past-academic track record
- Students are selected for admission to First Year B.A., B. Com and B.Sc. with at least 40% of marks at 10 +2 level.
- Students are selected for admission to P.G. Classes with at least 45% marks at degree level.

#### **Self-financing Courses :**

The admissions of the self-financing UG and PG courses such as, B.B.A, B.C.A., Biotechnology, Bioinformatics and Biochemistry are on the basis of the common Entrance Test conducted by the college in the first week of June, the details of which are displayed on the notice boards of the concerned departments. The admissions for these courses are based on the following criteria:

- 50 % weightage for the marks obtained in the qualifying examination.
- 50% weightage for the marks obtained in the Entrance Test.
- Merit at the previous qualifying examination is considered for the subjects which are in high demand, for example B.Sc. Computer Science, I.T. Biotechnology, Biochemistry, Chemistry, Analytical Chemistry and Microbiology.
- Admission through interview is done for Diploma in Business Management.

#### **Vocational Courses:**

#### **Multimedia and Animation**

• The eligibility condition for admission shall be 10+2 (Science) or equivalent. The selecton procedure is as per University norms and institution guidelines.

#### Jewellery Designing and Gemology

• The eligibility condition for admission shall be 10+2 (any stream) or equivalent. The selecton procedure is as per University norms and institution guidelines.

## 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

At the end of the admission, the whole process is reviewed and recommendations for change are suggested and instituted.

#### **Review of Admission Process**

- After admission, the Admission Committee reviews the admission process.
- The use of ICT facilitates the admission process and has reduced the amount of paperwork as well as the use of paper. The ICT enabled process has facilitated the generation of student profile reports.
- The committee also ascertains the need and relevance of the existing programmes. The subjects with high demand ratio necessitate the introduction of new programmes under Self-Finance stream. Suitable measures are planned to augment the demand for programmes with less demand ratio.

#### **Outcome of the Analysis**

- Self-financing Certificate Courses were introduced as per the demand.
- PG programmes in Mathematics and Geology were introduced in 2014-2015
- Additional divisions are introduced
- The departments with less demand intensified their publicity mechanisms, by conducting workshops for students to increase the student enrolment.
- Admission process is decentralized

#### **Improvement in maintaining Student Profiles:**

- Student profiles are categorized and maintained in the college office, after admission.
- Resumes of individual students are kept updated by the mentors in the departments.
- Counselling by the mentors help the students to identify their aptitude and needs and enable them to make the correct choice of subjects for further study.

#### **Observation of Trends:**

- Admissions to BA courses have increased every year.
- Number of girls students has increased during the last four years.
- Admissions to B.B.A and B.C.A (mg) are less enthusiastic.
- Admissions to M.Sc Biochemistry are decreasing.



2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect theNational commitment to diversity and inclusion

#### SC / ST / OBC / Economically Weaker Sections :

- In accordance with Government norms, the candidates from SC/ST and OBC communities, first generation learners, rural, educationally, economically and socially backward classes of the society are given priority in admission.
- Remedial coaching given to the slow learners of these communities, enable them to join the mainstream.
- Scholarships are procured for them to ease their financial constraints.
- Tuition fee is completely waived for daughters of destitute widows. Besides tuition fee, bus and mess fee concession, free accommodation in the hostel and free lunch are provided to students from the economically weaker sections.

#### Women:

Financial concession is given in admission and hostel fees to girls. The positive impact of this is apparent from the high number of girls students both in the courses of study and in the hostels run by the College.

#### Different categories of persons with disabilities:

- This is perhaps our forte, as Deogiri College has a disabled friendly campus with ramps constructed for accessibility across the buildings on the campus, with wheel chair accessibility within the College.
- The College has total 08 physically challenged students taking education during last five years.
- Miss Pardeshi Renuka studying in M.A. II year has been provided with four wheeler scooter. The students like Mr. Hindule Nandkumar Bhagwan, are visually challenged. They are provided facilities like brail machine and Low Vision Software.
- All physically challenged students are given fees concession. In the year, 2013-2014, physically challenged students like Aute Jija Ashok, Bombale Ravindra Ashok, Hindule Nandkumar Bhagwan, Marathe Kaumudi Vinayak and Marathe Ruchira Vinayak received finacial support from the college.
- Special concern is shown to the differently-abled students of all categories in admission.
- All possible efforts are made to get them scholarships from various sources.




#### **Economically Weaker Sections :**

#### Reasons for increase / decrease of demand ratio

- The more / less scope for placement is the reason for the increase / decrease in demand for the UG, PG. Less demand ratio for PG programmes is due to the interest of students and their parents in B.Ed. programme which is the minimum qualification to become a teacher leading to life settlement.
- To cater to the increasing demand, steps are taken to introduce Job Oriented Certificate Courses in various disciplines.
- Counselling for the UG students regarding the availability of diverse job / research opportunities motivates them to take up PG programmes.
- Additional seats are sought from the affiliating University, for the programmes with high demand.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable t he m to cope with the programme of their choice?

The college attempts to bridge the gap among the students through the following measures:

• Students who come from disadvantaged rural communities face learning difficulties especially due to their lack of communicative skills in ENGLISH.



To overcome this problem, Department of English conducts short term certificate course in English

#### Business Communication in English: 3 months duration Certificate Course in Spoken English: 2 months duration

- The college organized Motivational Bridge Course in Mathematical Methods in Physics and Laboratory Practices. It was organized by the Department of Physics, Deogiri College for I and II year B.Sc students in association with Indian Association of Physics Teachers RC-8 during 15th June to 9th July, 2011. It was sponsored by Indian Academy of Sciences (IAS), Bagalore, Indian Science Academy (INSA), New Delhi, National Academy of Sciences, India (NASI), Allahabad.
- The college also offers various add-on courses to generate interest in the subjects they learn in the subsequent semesters, to enrich their knowledge and provide additional qualifications.
- Remedial help is given to slow learners. The following are some of the departments offering remedial coaching:

- Extra coaching classes are conducted for students admitted late.
- Guest lecturers from the industries are invited and their lectures help students to get practical and in-depth knowledge on subject-related areas.
- Industrial visits and field trips are organized for the students.
- Monitoring of students' progress is done through the Mentoring system.
- Individual help is rendered as and when required by respective teachers.



### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

#### Gender Sensitivity :

- Equal opportunities are provided for all eligible individuals to participate in any of the academic / extracurricular, co-curricular activities.
- Women Empowerment Cell of the college takes initiative in conducting various activities on gender sensitive issues and brings women experts to the campus to interact with the girl students.
- Awarded first prize by Higher and Technical Education, State Govt for for successful implementation of the women empowerment programme –Jagar Janivancha.
- 'Shirami' a short film, which depicts the plight of women in villages, is directed, written and produced by Mr. Anilkumar Salve, the Head of the Department of Drama, and the students of the Department acted in the film.
- Plays/ dramas, documentary scripts/ screenings followed by discussions on these issues are organized by the Drama department.
- Ms. Sunita Thakre, working as DYSP, is the alumni of our college. She is invited as the Chief Guest of the Alumni Meet. It shows that the Institution is sensitive towards empowerment of women.
- Prominent speakers/ activists invited to address issues pertaining to gender.

#### **Environment :**

- The College makes a thorough environmental assessment of the campus and implements healthy ecological practices in water and energy conservation and waste management. The three 'R's: Reduce, Reuse, & Recycle form the essence of every eco-friendly practice adopted in the College.
- Students are motivated to keep a clean and litter-free environment in their class rooms and laboratories in particular, and around the campus in general. Dustbins/Litter-bins are kept at strategically located places within the college campus.
- In order to make students conscious about their responsibility towards the environment they are advised to save electricity by switch off the lights and fans while leaving the classrooms and laboratories.
- In support of conservation of nature the college also implements the healthy practices such as, No Vehicle Day on the first working day of every month.
- Environmental Day and World Water Day are also celebrated.



- Rain Water Harvesting Project resulting in saving of 33 million litres of water per year.
- A project of Recycling Water with capacity of 20,000 thousand litre water.
- Weather station is installed in the College.
- One day workshop on Water Management and Rriver Interlinking 22 March, 2012.
- National conference on Ecostudies /Green studies: perspectives from literature, Life Science and Earth Science -2-3 Feb, 2013.
- Workshop on Status of Threatened Medicinal Plants and Their Conservation 13 May, 2011.
- The college has integrated Environmental Studies into the curriculum to create among students an awareness of environmental concepts and issues both as members of a college community and as responsible citizens.

#### **Inclusivity :**

- Value added education lectures are arranged for all the college students, through which they are sensitized on various issues such as the importance of education for the weaker sections and combating social evils. They are motivated to acquire an inclusive attitude towards one and all. The twin values of equality and brotherhood are inculcated in them.

- With over 5000 average enrolments per year and above 200 staff members, we have a significant diversity in student and staff community across varied religious and ethnic backgrounds. By bringing in dedicated student cells and cultural programmes, we promote awareness and appreciation of cultural diversity among our students and staff.
- Celebration of Birth Anniversaries of eminent personalities such as Shivaji Maharaj, Swami Vivekananda, Savitribai Phule, Dr. Sarvapalli Radhakrishnan, Ramanujam, Dr.B.R.Ambedkar etc., also motivates the students and staff communities to imbibe the great qualities of these eminent personalities which in itself would help in sensitizing and creation of awareness of harmonic co-existence.
- Phule Shahu Ambedkar Lecture Series is one of the prestigious activities of the college to inculcate human values. The aim of the series is to provide a platform for the expression on thoughts and works of Mahatma Phule, Rajashri Shahu and Dr. B.R. Ambedkar and their relevance in today's world.

- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of dropout (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
  - The college keeps records of attendance of the students in the form of attendance sheet and assesses the academic performance of the students through internal examinations, assignments and projects.
  - The concerned teacher and mentor evaluate performance of the students.
  - The College also has an active attendance monitoring system which is analyzed and reviewed regularly. Trends of absenteeism are picked out, thus also identifying potential dropouts in the process.
  - The dropout rate of the college is very less due to the following initiatives:
  - The identified students and their parents/guardians are counseled and approached to ascertain the reasons causing absenteeism and poor academic performance



- Students are individually called for discussion with mentor to solve academic difficulties.
- The College offers various subject combinations so as to accommodate choices which meet students' likes and preferences. This has helped to evade the problem of fall in attendance, failure in exams, and general irregularities
- In case of any economic problems faced by the students necessary financial aid is provided such as fee waiving, delayed fee payment options to the student.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

#### Academic calendar:

The Academic Calendar is prepared prior to the commencement of the academic year, specifying available dates for significant activities to ensure proper teaching-learning transaction and continuous evaluation.

The college follows academic calendar of events (course-wise and subject wise for UG and PG courses) based on requirement, feedback and academic planning. All the teachers are provided an academic diary in which the academic calendar is printed.

• **Teaching Plan:** The departmental meetings are held at the commencement of the academic year to assign workload to individual teachers. The syllabi of the different years/classes are discussed in detail. After that each teacher prepares the month/week wise teaching plan for the academic year. All the teachers scrupulously stick to the teaching plan in the completion of the syllabus, much before the commencement of the examination.

### The teaching plan is prepared giving due consideration to the following factors:

- The total quantum of the syllabus to be taught
- Workable distribution of the total syllabus into convenient teaching units
- Equitable proportion of teaching units and teaching dates
- Availability of required teaching aids
- Schedule of internal as well as external evaluation, vis a vis teaching units to be covered

#### Dates of Academic and personal duties

• The teaching plan is submitted to the office in triplicate as well as entered in the diary provided to the teachers.

#### Academic Diary:

• The teachers have to maintain the Academic Diary wherin period-wise academic delivery has to be mentioned. It is monitored by the Head of Department and the Principal

#### **Evaluation Blue Print:**

- Question papers and practical examination patterns and scheme of marking are explained to the students in the beginning of the academic year.
- The examination time-table as per the schedule fixed by the University is displayed more than a month in advance on the notice boards for the information of the students. The university also displays links on its website in advance.
- The examinations are conducted as per the schedule and the centralized evaluation of the answer papers is organized by university.
- After exminations, a process of assessment for the first year students is scheduled with internal teachers, while the S. Y. and T.Y. papers go through the assessment process as per university central assessment programme.



- Students also have recourse to reevaluate their answer papers which is handled by an external examiner in the form of redressal at university level.
- Evaluation of tutorials, and unit tests and papers of internal examination is done immediately after the submission of papers.
- Marks of tutorials, unit tests and internal examination are considered for judging the performance of student throughout the year.

#### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

To achieve the goals and objectives of the college, the IQAC plays an important role in the quality enhancement in the teaching-learning process.

- The IQAC holds meetings in which activities relating to the academic development of the students such as regular lectures, guest lectures, seminars, workshops, cocurricular activities, and study tours are planned. This information is then shared with all the HODs as well as faculty members for effective implementation.
- The IQAC analyzes the feedback obtained from the students on faculty, curriculum, infrastructure etc. and suggests suitable steps for improvement.
- It also encourages teachers to participate in Seminars, workshops, conferences which broadens the knowledge horizon of the teachers and helps them in keeping abreast with the recent developments in their respective subjects.
- The IQAC works in close coordination with the Academic Council and all the committees of the college to ensure effective implementation of the activities planned.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

#### **Support Structures:**

- The College provides Wi-Fi Campus, English Language Lab, computer labs, ICT oriented class rooms, adequate collection of Reference Books, resources like enhancing digital data base, e-journal subscription, INFLIBNET, etc. to reduce the hurdles of efficient learning.
- The management encourages teachers to organize and attend Faculty Development Programs, Workshops, and Conferences which broadens their knowledge horizon and encourages them to adopt innovative teaching methods.
- Regular training sessions for staff regarding ICT enabled teaching-learning methodologies. (Please refer to 6.2.3)
- The institution believes in exploiting and exploring the ICT concepts and has therefore provided sufficient computers to the faculties with internet facility. The faculty during their non-teaching hours extensively uses the internet facility to further acquire superior skills in interactive and collaborative learning
- Research facilities with well equipped laboratories are available for independent and collaborative research
- The library forms an important support structure for all academic programmes and related research activities of the College. The library has extensive holdings of resource materials in both print and digital format and a number of services offered to all users.

## 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.
  - The challenge of completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar is not very severe. However, due to unforeseen and unavoidable situations like National/State elections, strikes, unscheduled extracurricular activities, delays in the University schedule in the commencement of terms/semesters, there may be a problem in completing the syllabus within the stipulated time period. These lost working days are made up by conducting extra classes weekdays and/or Sundays.
  - Unavailability of existing faculty in the case of emergencies like study leave, sick leaves, hospitalization, the curriculum remains unfinished at certain points of time; such unfinished workload is assigned to substitute part-time faculty.

## 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The college implements the self-appraisal mechanism for evaluating the faculty performance on the dimensions of teaching, research, consultancy and administrative work at the end of the academic year. The self-appraisal is analyzed by the concerned Head of the Department and the Principal.
- The principal discusses personally the performance of each teacher, appreciates good work and gives necessary advice and guidance for improved performance.
- The academic performance of the students in internal and University examination is a vital indicator of the quality of teaching and learning. The results of various tests and examinations are analyzed; the findings of such analysis are used to strengthen the teaching-learning process further.
- Feedbacks are obtained from the students on teaching methodology of faculty members. The data is collected and then analyzed by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell. After that, the IQAC has counseling sessions with individual faculty members if and where improvement is needed. Faculties with good feedback are appreciated. Suggestions obtained from students are shared with the teachers. This helps the teachers to introspect and improve their teaching skills.



#### 2.4 Teacher Quality

# 2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The procedure of the recruitment of the teachers is done strictly on the basis of the guidelines laid down by UGC (University Grants Commission), Government of Maharashtra and University.

#### The entire procedure in brief, is as follows

- 1. The college submits subject-wise workload on the basis of subject-wise strength of the students along with the list of existing staff to the Joint Director of Higher Education.
- 2. The Joint Director scrutinizes the workload as per the government norms and sanctions the posts to be filled.
- 3. The number of vacant posts is conveyed to the special cell of the university
- 4. The university fixes subject- wise reservation and allows the publication of the advertisement.
- 5. After the publication of the advertisement a selection committee consisting of university nominee, subject experts, a government representative and experts nominated by management, is formed to interview and select the eligible and meritorious candidates.
- 6. The candidates are selected by oral interviews and if required, through demonstration lectures.

In order to maintain high benchmark of teaching adhering to the set norms, teachers with excellent academic record and zeal for hard work are recruited. During service teachers are encouraged to maintain high academic level by granting opportunities for reference reading, research work and extension activities.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

Need of qualified faculty to teach new programmes is identified by the Principal in consultation with the HODs and the IQAC.



- Efforts are made to attract faculty applicants with required academic credentials in emerging areas, by advertising in leading Newspapers.
- In addition, existing faculty members are trained in-house or sent for training outside to acquire knowledge and skills to teach disciplines in emerging subjects.
- Subject experts from industry and academia are also invited on a parttime/short-term basis. The library, laboratory and infrastructural resources are augmented and enriched.
- During the last 3 years, some of these efforts were put to use in strengthening faculty resources in new programmes like Multimedia and Animation, Jewellery Designing and Gemology, M.Sc. Mathematics, Bio-technology, Bio-Informatics, Business Management, IT, etc. Due to these initiatives the Institution has been able to effectively retain top talent in the emerging areas mentioned above.

## 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

#### **Internal Evaluation:**

- Feedbacks are obtained from the students on important teaching parameters viz use of teaching aids, development of course file, accessibility of faculty, summary of formative work done, syllabus covered, beyond syllabus efforts, types of tests given, etc.
- The data is collected and then analyzed by the Feedback Analysis Committee in consultation with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell. After that, the IQAC has counseling sessions with individual faculty members if and where improvement is needed. Faculties with good feedback are appreciated. Suggestions obtained from students are shared with all the teachers. This helps the teachers to introspect and improve their teaching skills.

#### **External Evaluation:**

• The college is an ISO certified one. It has helped in enhancing the professional development of teaching staff. Interactions of the staff with the team of ISO auditors do results in introduction to new and innovative ways of teaching-learning and systematic monitoring of teaching-learning process.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- At the commencement of the academic year, all the teachers explain the students the evaluation methods framed by the University such as question paper pattern, practical examination pattern and scheme of marking.
- College Website, LCD display, circulars disseminates information and guidelines regarding the examination schedule.
- Students are informed well in advance before the University exams about the evaluation methods.
- The Departmental libraries are well equipped with previous years question papers.
- Class tests and assignments are conducted as per university calendar and the results are published on the university website.
- Notices/Circulars/Ordinances pertaining to the pattern of examinations and the pattern of the question papers are displayed on the notice board.
- The faculty members are made aware of the recent updates of the evaluation process through workshops organized by different institutions.
- Parents get to know the evaluation methods through the College website as well.



## 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

#### **Evaluation Reforms initiated by University:**

- The University has introduced semester system for all levels of all streams and subjects.
- The semester pattern is designed to have internal assessment consisting of test and tutorial / seminar carrying 20 marks per semester and University Semester end examination consisting of 30 marks.
- However, for UG courses the internal assessment system has been eliminated by the university w. e. f. 2013 2014. Presently the University Semester end examination is of 50 marks.
- The single answer book system was introduced in 2010. Each student is provided with a single answer booklet of 32 pages. No additional answer sheets are provided to them
- All the Semester end examinations are conducted by the college as per the schedule provided by the University.
- Centralized assessment scheme is followed by the University
- The assessment of answer books is done by expert teachers, invited from all the colleges affiliated to the university.

#### Evaluation Reforms initiated by the institution:

- Information about evaluation programme is given to the students after admission.
- Knowledge and skill test after admission: Students are assessed by the teachers through frequent interactions in the initial lectures. Such a practice helps the teachers to segment the students into different groups for providing the required kind of academic task.
- Class Tests
- First Term Examination
- Second Term Examination

#### **Transparency in evaluation:**

- The students can apply for revaluation of their answer scripts of Semester End Examinations by paying the prescribed fee.
- The student can get a photocopy of the assessed answer book after the declaration of the results. This can be done by paying the prescribed fee.
- Preparation of question banks
- The Credit System has been adopted for B. Voc. Courses



The motto of the present system is to make students to work regularly and continuously throughout the year and not just study for one or two months prior to the exams. It compels students to read standard books and not to become lackadaisical. Teachers motivate the students to understand that they are learning not for the sake of examination but for the sake of acquiring in depth and breadth of knowledge, so that they accept the policy of life-long learning from womb to tomb.

## 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- Dr. B.A.M.University, Aurangabad awarded the college as an Ideal Examination Centre for innovative and outstanding practices in conducting the university examinations during 2012-13 and 2013-14
- For the smooth conduct of the Examination and the Evaluation thereafter, Internal Examination Monitoring Committee, Examination Committee and Students' Grievances Cell are constituted by the college. The evaluation reforms are implemented promptly and as part of it
- Students' performances are monitored continuously by respective mentors and taking appropriate actions to improve the performance as and when needed.

#### 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Before the end of every semester a test exam is conducted to formulate a summative evaluation and the students are mentored and are corrected based on their performance.

#### Formative evaluation process :

The goal of formative assessment is to monitor students' learning to provide ongoing feedback that can be used by instructors to improve their teaching and by students to improve their learning. More specifically, formative assessments:

- ✓ help students identify their strengths and weaknesses and target areas that need to be worked on
- ✓ help faculty recognize where students are struggling and address problems immediately
- The formative evaluation is done as per university norms in the form of unit tests, assignments, seminar presentations and viva voce. This helps the students to face the exam without any fear. With regard to the practical exam



the students are given enough exposure by the concerned departments. Model practical exams are also conducted to acquire sufficient practice.

- The college also encourages the students to take up projects, paper presentation, attend workshops, seminars etc. which provides forum for formative evaluation.
- There is noticeable increase in the usage of library and internet facilities as most of the activities are reference based.

### Summative evaluation process :

The goal of summative assessment is to evaluate students' learning at the end of an instructional unit by comparing it against some standard or benchmark. Summative assessments are often at high stakes, which means that they have a high point value.

- Institute conducts Two Internal Assessment Tests
- Practical and viva voce examinations
- University examinations

#### **Impact of Assessment:**

The formative and summative evaluation has the following impact on students:

- The formative assessment helps the teacher to decide on the teaching-learning process according to the academic level of students
- The summative assessment determines how much of the content taught is retained by the student.

### 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

Rigor and transparency in internal assessment is followed. The departments conduct internal assessment giving due weightage for -

- Students' active participation in the class.
- Overall conduct as a responsible learner.
- Leadership qualities in organizing academic and co-academic activities.
- Independent learning capability.
- Communication Skills.
- Regularity of students.

The performance in seminar presentations and assignments and the percentage of attendance are considered for internal marks. Assignments such as tutorials are given well in advance each semester and the timely submission is ensured



by the departments. The behavioural traits, aptitude for independent learning and communication skill of students are reflected in their presentations, tutorial sessions, viva voce, regular attendance and timely submission of assignments. Grievances of students are resolved by clarifying their queries based on their performance in test and tutorials to assure transparency. The heads of the department handover attendance and internal marks lists of the students to the administrative section incharge of examinations.

## 2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation at the college level are looked into by the Examination Committee. The Chairman of the Examination Committee is the Chief Examination Officer (CEO). This position is mandatory as per University norms. A senior and experienced in conducting several examinations is appointed as the CEO. The grievances are settled in accordance with the guidelines issued by Dr. B.A. M. University, Aurangabad as well as the internal examination policy of the College.

**University Examination** – Students apply for revaluation and verification of marks. The photocopy of answer books is provided to students on demand by University after paying some fee. After receiving own answer-sheet if student wants he/she can apply for reassessment of answer book. In addition, follow up is kept with the University till the grievance is settled.

**Internal examination** – After assessment, answer books of Assessment Tests as well as Semester Internal Tests are shown to all students and if there is any



query the concerned student can approach the teacher. Since the internal marks are awarded by the teachers, any complaint regarding anomalies is taken care of in the College itself.

- Increased the resourcefulness of the institution in terms of quality faculty for research methodology workshops and lectures both within and outside the campus.

### 3.3 Research Facilities

The college has a broad vision for promotion of research. The institution has adopted multiple strategies for planning, upgrading and creating research facilities. The functioning of Academic Council and Research and Extension committee go hand-in-hand.

The prime functions of Research and Extension committee are :

Keeping in view the growing importance of employability through campus interviews, the college has recognized the need and importance of development of students' personality, interviewing, attitude and aptitude skills. The college has appointed a well-qualified training and placement officer (TPO) in Career Guidance and Placement Cell which schedules placement programmes with timely correspondence with different firms and companies. Various industrial houses and IT firms conduct recruitment and placement campaigns in the campus which benefit the students of the college. College is successful in organizing campus interview of many renowned companies like INFOSYS, TCS, WIPRO, etc persistently. Due to the well-developed auditorium and other infrastructural facilities, many companies prefer the college for pooled campus drives.

Besides it, MoUs and collaborations with different institutes and industries, students' field visits and study tours, different programmes by NCC and NSS units bring about industry-institution-community interactions that ultimately result into developing infrastructure on the campus.

#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

- Total campus area is of 10.32 acres including built up area of 23049 sq mt.
- The college has a big library consisting of 113324 books and its first floor is a reading hall for students.
- The college has two boys' hostels and two girls' hostels accommodating 1057 students.
- The campus houses science laboratories, ICT enabled classrooms, library, NCC and NSS rooms, ladies common rooms, seminar halls, a well constructed auditorium, a conference hall and two canteens.
- Infrastructure for sports consists of gymnasium, sports hall an0064 sports ground.

## 4.1.1 What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

- Increasing number of students and courses requires necessary creation and enhancement of infrastructure for smooth functioning of teaching and learning. Infrastructure is created and enhanced constantly keeping in view the changes on different level.
- Infrastructure creation and development is also done by various sources like feedback of students on campus infrastructure and facilities, observation by the management from their continuous visits to college and recommendation by different college committees. Accordingly the principal proposes the need for infrastructural development every year in Governing Council meetings and budget requirements are evaluated by management and it approves the proposals. The budget proposals are constituted keeping in view the last year's expenditure. While doing so, management also takes proper care to strengthen the facilities at departments. The council also monitors the utilization of grants received from UGC, DST, etc. in order to meet infrastructural needs to make the college campus teaching and learning friendly and advanced.
- Deogiri College is committed to improve the students centric teachinglearning process which results into making nine classrooms equipped with ICT enhanced teaching aids.
- Education for students from rural area is one of the highlights of vision and mission of the institute. Keeping this in view, the college has undertaken the work of extension of hostel and college infrastructure. The increasing number of enrolment requires enhancement in infrastructure. Hostel facilities for girls and boys prove very helpful for the students from rural area. Especially for



girl students from rural area, '**no hostel means no education**'. Besides the extension in existing girls' hostels, the college has chalked out a plan for a new girls' hostel in the college campus.

- Museum at the department of History helps students to study and learn various artefacts belonging to the different time of culture and period.
- The college has well equipped auditorium, library with eBooks and sophisticated laboratories for the teaching- learning and research.
- For creation or up gradation of an infrastructure, learners and researchers are invited for the discussions.
- The satisfaction of end user policy has been adopted for the development of infrastructure.
- It has been an un-written policy that encourages each department to have a smart classroom equipped with LCD overhead projector, laptop/desktop for effective presentation.
- College has provided internet facility and virtual lectures for better learning and also for effective teacher-students communication.Well-equipped Science Laboratories are available in all science departments as to promote the higher order skills for practical and dissertation work.
- A language lab in the department of English has been strengthened.

The museums at Department of Geology and History are unique in their features. A wide sport ground amidst the college campus offers students



opportunities to practice and play the games like hockey, football, cricket, volleyball, etc. The central research laboratories consist of sophisticated research equipments. Girls' hostels have gymnasium that helps the girl students do exercise there.

- **Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching**: In science laboratories, animal models, preserved specimens and elaborative charts are available for teaching and learning activities. There are LCD projectors and internet (wired) connectivity, well equipped Audio-Video facilities and language lab.
- **Research space**: A well developed central research lab facility is provided with high end equipments for quality research. Total 10 departments have university recognised Ph.D. research guides. However Ph.D guides are available in 13 subjects. Along with Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Electronics, Environmental Science, Mathematics, Geology, Commerce, Sociology, Marathi, Hindi and English, Department of Biotechnology and Bioinformatics are also engaged in research.

#### • NCC:

College has two units of NCC for girls and boys affiliated to Army Wing Maharashtra Directorate, Aurangabad, Group 51 Maharashtra Battalian. SD. NCC has two separate offices for the units. They have capacity of 54 cadets of each unit. Adequate infrastructural facilities like offices and store rooms at campus encourage proper functioning of NCC at college. It is why college boasts its outstanding achievement.

#### • NSS:

College's is the biggest NSS unit among all colleges affiliated to Dr. B.A. M. University, Aurangabad. There are three units of NSS consisting of 300 students of which there are 200 boys and 100 girl students. It has an office room and a store room. It undertakes programmes like tree plantation, AIDS awareness programs, blood donation camp, anti-drug addiction programs, literacy awareness program, construction of percolation tanks at villages, water management programs, plastic collection programmes, etc. NSS unit organizes a camp every year at nearby villages.

#### • Cultural Activities and Public Speaking:

College has developed adequate infrastructure that allows teaching faculty to organize different program. The ICT equipped classrooms, seminar halls, auditorium and full-fledged departments like Music and Drama present myriad opportunities for students to prepare for various cultural and public speaking competitions.

#### • Seminar hall:

Cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, blood donation camps, elocution competitions, yoga, health and hygiene awareness programmes are organized in the seminar hall.



#### • Auditorium:

Rabindranath Tagore Auditorium has been developed with seating capacity of 300. This hall is used for the cultural programmes, campus placement drives, Phule-Shahu-Ambedkar Lecture Series, guest lectures, conferences, induction programmes and meetigs.

#### • Gandhian Study Centre:

A well developed Gandhian Study Centre works for propagation of the principles and ideology of M.K. Gandhi. The centre constantly organizes different programs and events to spread the ideas of Gandhi through exam like 'Gandhi Vichar Darshan Pariksha', a certificate and diploma course in Gandhian studies. It has been funded by UGC, New Delhi.

#### • Women Empowerment Cell:

Aiming at the emancipation and empowerment of female students and staff, the cell chalks out the programs routinely. It correlates with the programs of Vishakha Cell and Sexual Harassment Cell. It has been provided with an office and supporting staff.

#### > Other Facilities:

#### • Jogging Track:

The college has a well bricked jogging track about 450 metres around the play ground. Not only the students and the staff from the college take advantage of the track but also the citizens from neighborhood come to take morning and evening walk around the ground. Elderly people come in good number to make use of the track. It is open from 5.00 am to 8.00 am and 5.00 pm to 8.30 pm everyday.

#### • Appex Career Academy:

College offers infrastructural facilities like hall and an office room to Appex Career Academy which is a professional unit offering guidance in preparing for competitive exams of different kind. In turn, it offers concession to college students. It has proved very helpful for students to prepare for competitive exams.

#### • Health Centre:

A regular doctor is appointed in college's health centre. The doctor offers her services from 9.00am to 01.00 pm from Monday to Friday. Her services are useful to girl students as her visits to girls' hostels are scheduled.

  - The Principal of the college proposes extension, construction and renovation of the existing facilities in accordance with the academic growth and augmentation of additional facilities of equipments and other infrastructural facilities. It is mainly done by keeping in view the addition in courses and increasing number of students. To make optimum use of the existing infrastructure for teaching and learning, time table of UG and PG is designed in a systematic way.

The college has commenced two degree courses entitled Bachelor of Vocational in Jewellery Designing and Gemmology, and Multimedia and Animation. M.Sc. in Mathematics and Geology are commenced from the academic year 2014 -2015. Sanskrit is also introduced at UG level as an optional subject. Keeping in view these additions and increasing number of students, college has enhanced the existing infrastructure like Geology Museum, History Museum, girls hostels, language laboratory, research labs, Central Research Lab, playground, etc.



The college has appointed a doctor in its health centre who works from 09.00 am to 01.00 pm from Monday to Friday. The centre has necessary equipment and medicines for primary medications.

Yoga camps are arranged for the students and staff of the college. The Department of Psychology organizes such camps for teaching and non-teaching staff. It also runs a short *Certificate Course in Mental Health*. Besides it, college organizes programs about health consciousness where



eminent medical practioners and nutritional counsellors conduct sessions on health issue. The Department of Home Science always offers dietary and nutrional couselling to teaching and non-teaching staff. It also offers such services to the sports persons. - Certain classes of optional English papers are engaged in language laboratories which facilitates the learning.
- 4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.
  - The institution has up-graded computer laboratories with internet connectivity. The classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors.
  - Faculty members prepare presentations on various topics related to the curriculum by making the use of ICT tools.
  - The entire campus is networked; students and teachers use internet facility.
  - Online Tutorials/Videos are used by the faculty and students which make the class more interactive.
  - Resource material like Power Point Presentations made by the teachers is also available for reference.
  - College has enhanced language lab with 25 consoles of ORELL.

### 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- The college takes necessary care and precaution towards the maintenance of its infrastructure, facilities and equipments.
- Annual maintenance contract for biotech equipments are made with manufacturers.
- Water and drainage line are regularly maintained.
- Cleaning work at college is outsourced and a team of workers including ladies staff undertake the work of cleanliness of the campus early in the morning, afternoon and in the evening. They collect the garbage and it is disposed in a systematic way.



- Electric fittings are regularly checked and replaced whenever necessary by the three electricians appointed in the college. They are always on their rounds to check electric fittings and promptly attend to all staff whenever there is a need for their services.
- One plumber and two building super-wisers look after building maintenance and sanitation facilities.
- Colour and patching of the college premises is undertaken on an annual basis.
- Housekeeping and cleaning contract is made on yearly basis.
- Furniture including benches, desks, tables, cupboards and chairs are repaired and some are replaced by two permanent carpenters appointed by the college.
- Threre are two computer technicians who look after the work of proper functioning of computers, printers and servers.
- Technicians are called for repairs of LCD, computers, laboratory equipments and apparatuses.
- The college has also appointed a gardener.

### 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

- Calibration of equipments by technical experts is carried out as and when necessary.
- In department of Biotechnology and Bioinformatics a routine daily calibration of equipments like pH meters, autoclaves, Incubators, etc are carried out by faculty members only.
- Fire Safety Equipments are checked by **CEASEFIRE INDUSTRIES LTD.** Nashik- 422011.



- Some of high end equipments are self calibrating.
- Most of the instruments are calibrated as per the guidelines given in their manuals.

### 4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- Maharashtra State Electricity Board has provided the college with a dedicated express electric line. As such, there are no voltage fluctuations.
- College is replacing tube and bulbs with CFLs which ensure less consumption of energy and durability.
- College has a diesel operated three generator of capacity 25 KVa each.
- Uninterrupted power supply using inverters are installed in many departments.
- Similarly the Municipal Corporation of Aurangabad has provided a steady water line to the college.
- College has huge water storage tanks which give constant supply of water.
- College has a dugwell with good source of water.
- College also does recharging of the borewells on the campus and rain water harvesting.

#### 5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

It consists of information about B.Sc Biotechnology, B.Sc Bioinformatics and M.Sc in Bioinformatics, Biotechnology, Microbiology and Biochemistry. The separate publication of the prospectus helps the college to provide adequate information about the sciences.

The messages of the president, the secretary and the principal of the institute are printed welcoming the students to the college and assuring them good quality education.

#### The Vision & Mission :

The vision and the mission statement of the institution are printed in the prospectus. The widespread network of education and the milestones of the institution are summarized.



#### Strength:

A brief history of the college, highlighting its re-accreditation status, academic and infrastructure development, students support services and guidance services, is provided. 'Student life at Deogiri College and after Deogiri College' consists of brief information about N.C.C. and N.S.S. units, sports facilities, incentives and scholarships, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, Gandhian Study Centre, social enlightenment, women empowerment cell and earn and learn scheme, counseling centre for students, career and placement cell for campus interviews and study centres for competitive examinations.

#### **Programmes and Courses:**

The details of the programs, courses, course structures, course curricula, eligibility criteria for graduate degree programs, post graduate diplomas, certificate course structure, vocational degree program, diploma and Ph.D programs are provided as per the guidelines by state government and the affiliated university. An introduction of various allied facilities available to students such as laboratories, seminars and conferences, fitness center, students' council, physical education and sports, canteens and extension counter of the bank is given.

#### Admission Procedure and Code of Conduct:

The college carefully structures the prospectus maintaining the various kind of information. It is to provide the information about the college and its courses in a better form so that more students are attracted towards the college for admission. The care is taken to make it more reader friendly. We have introduction of the departments and departmental activities, admission procedure for different degree courses, rules and regulations pertaining scholarship, facilities in research, rules of code of conduct, information about various scholarship and prizes, faculty details and important college contact numbers.

#### Calender on Major Events and Activities – Curricular and Co-curricular:

The brochure contains academic calender that gives idea to students about the major events and activities to be arranged in the academic year. It also offers information about various short term courses and diploma courses. The information about Placement and Career Guidance Cell and schedule of its activities give idea to students about the job opportutinities through campus interviews.

#### **Ensuring Commitment and Accountability:**

Deogiri College constantly reviews and update the prospectus/brochure of information annually. Feedbacks received from various stakeholders



incorporate positively improving the contents of the prospectus. Besides it, constituents like Academic Council, Coordination Committee, etc also come up with suggestions to improve the information quality in the prospectus.

• Equal Opportunity Centre: The college has streamlined and regularized the activities of the centre. It organizes various programmes to create awareness about equality on various basis like gender, economy, class, etc. It organizes various programmes under the title. It organized an intesnsive programme for 12 days in 2013-14. It included interdepartmental opportunity awareness program, visits to governmental offices providing various social services, banks, nearby villages, MECD, museum, etc.

#### • Students with physical disabilities

Brail machine and Low Vision Software for blind and partially blind students are made available in the library. A three wheeler scooter is provided by the college to a physically disabled student. Fees concession is also provided to physical disabled students. There are total 08 physically challenged students that took education in the college during last five years. **Miss Pardeshi Renuka** studying in M.A. II year has been provided with four wheeler scooter. The students like **Mr. Hindule Nandkumar Bhagwan**, are visually challenged. They provided facilities like brail machine and Low Vision Software. All physically challenged students are given fees concession. In the year, 2013-2014, physically challenged students like **Aute Jija Ashok**, **Bombale Ravindra Ashok, Hindule Nandkumar Bhagwan, Marathe Kaumudi Vinayak and Marathe Ruchira Vinayak** received finacial support from the college.



#### • Overseas students

There are two overseas students studying in the college.

• Students to participate in various competitions/ National and International?

Adequate infrastructure is provided to the students preparing for various competitions. It includes gymnasium, hall for practicing's cultural performances, playground, a special cell is formed and its committee members guide to the students for debate and elocution competitions, required infrastructure is provided by the college i.e. books and magazines from library, net facility and financial support.

#### • Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

College has established a health Centre in its campus. A lady doctor has been appointed for medical services students. It has been proving very helpful for hostels students especially for girl students. The doctor is available in the centre from Monday to Friday during 9.00 am to 01.00 pm.

College organizes medical check-up camps for students, guest lecturs of well known medical practitioners and Yoga teachers, guest lecture on mental health and stress management. College also organized special guest lectures of gynecologists and yoga teachers for the girls. First-Aid boxes are available with all departments especially in laboratories. #### • Organizing Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams:

Placement and Career Guidance Cell organizes programmes of eminent persons in police and civil services. Their guidance proves motivating. Besides it, college has signed an MoU with Apex Career Point a professional coaching centre for competitive exams. The centre offers the college students very nominal fees. It proves very helpful especially for the economically weaker students. Since it is run in the premises of college, the girl students from college hostels prefer the centre and they need not go outside for such coaching. It is advantageous to them. The centre provides coaching for PSI/STI/MPSC/UPSC and other competitive examinations. It resulted into **155** students qualifying various exams of MPSC, UPSC, Army and DRDO.



College also organizes different programmes on various occasion where expert and renowned scholars present their discourses which helps in motivating students for career development. For example, the Department of Commerce organizes a guest lecture of a renowned scholar, Ex. Director of bank, CA, entrepreneur or a businessman in the beginning of very academic year. Different cells at college also organize guest lecturers of class one officers and officers selected in different competitive examinations.

A facility of books and magazines for different competitive examinations and computer with internet facility is provided in central library. It results in motivating students for preparation of competitive examinations and different types of employment.

#### • Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The affiliated university has tie-up with INFOSYS, Bangalore under which the teachers from the affiliated colleges are trained to train students for the industry. It is called **Train the Trainer Program** of INFOSYS' **Project Genesis**. Three teachers from the college have received the training in two categories of communication and soft skill enhancement and analytical skill development. The activity has resulted positive outcome. A certificate course in Advanced Business English is offered to train the students for industries like BPO and other.



- Essay Writing, Poetry Recitation, Elocution and Debate competition, Poster Competition are regulary organized. ### 5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

#### Academic counseling:

Every year at the time of admissions a separate committee works for the academic counseling, which provides guidance for selection of the subjects, scope and importance of the different subjects. Different departments arrange seminars and workshops for the academic counseling of the students.

#### **Personal Counseling:**

Every department has Student Mentoring programme. Students are divided among the available faculty in the department. Students seek gudiance and counseling as when required from their mentors. This activity helps students to express their ideas and share their problems with their teachers on various personal issues. Department of Psychology renders this service under "Disha Counseling".

#### **Career Counseling:**

Placement and Career Guidance Cell offers career counseling to the students. The cell arranges different seminars and workshops for career counseling. It also invites experts from industries like INFOSYS. Programmes organized by Commerce Association, Science Association, Social Science Association, etc also result in motivating students for better opportunities in career making.

#### **Psycho-social Counseling:**

The college invites resource persons and professionals for professional and psychological counseling. ### 5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, college has Student Grievance Redressal Cell. The Principal is the chaiman of the cell and he is assisted by the vice principals. Students bring their problems to the cell. Taking into consideration the gravity of the issue, the cell calls for meeting and resolves the problems to utmost satisfaction of the students.

There was a case regarding the conjuction of parking area. Students complained about the irregular parking lots. The cell held meetings with the contractor who looks after parking manangament. After the instructions by the cell, there had been no issue regarding any irregularity of parking lots.



### 5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

College has a separate committee named 'Vishakha'. This committee organizes different programs and guest lectures to create awareness and provide information regarding sexual harassment and discrimination. The committee is headed by a lady teacher.

- There was a complaint by a girl student that a boy troubled her by sending SMS. The case was carefully handled by the committee. The role of vice principals was very helpful. They came up with positive results.
- Girls students from girls' hostels complained about the lack of street lights near the college. It became troublesome for them to attend different classes in the city in late evening. The bulbs of the street lights were broken. The committee reported the matter to Municipal Corporation, Auranagabad. The corporation acting positively installed the new bulbs and they fenced the bulbs. This action proved very precautionary for any possible problems to girls students.

## 5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

There is an Anti Ragging Committee. The Committee is constituted on the guidelines established by the Supreme Court of India. The Principal of the college is the convener of the committee comprising of five members. Ours is an institute offering traditional courses and most of the students hail from rural areas. It is the matter of positivity of the thought that we are never troubled by any instance of ragging by students. A friendly atmosphere among students is nurtured on the campus and it always helps in leaning process of students in peace and harmony.

There are number of schemes through which the institute helps needy, physically challenged, poor students and the students particiapting sports or cultural events. College funds students' projects. Besides it, the doctor visits girls hostel on Sundays. College also organizes free medical check-up camps every year.

#### 5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

College has various companies that organize events of campus placement for its graduates. The companies like WNS –Glonerana, Hydrabad, WIPRO, Pune, IBM Global Process Services, Samarth Group, Aurangabad, Syntel Co. Ltd., Tata Motor Finance Ltd., Infosys Co. Ltd., Thyrocare Pvt. Ltd, Grainotech Industries Ltd, Accel Frontline Co.and Mahindra Tech are consulted about proper skill and professional development among students. Feedback is received from the HR teams visiting the college for placement drives. Placement and Career Counseling Cell looks after the whole process of placement right from inviting the companies to receiving feedback from them.



Feedback received from the employers both formally and informally, help in providing students with adequate information and training for their placement. The feedback taken from the departments like Chemistry, Biotechnology and Commerce also helps in improvements in curricular and syllabus designing of the short term certificate courses. The opinions of graduates of the college are also taken into consideration while making improvements on academic, infrastructure and student support services level.

#### > Former Faculty

Former faculty members are often invited as resource persons at special events such as workshops, seminars, inauguration of different association, etc. It becomes possible since almost 70% of retired faculty resides in Aurangabad after their retirement.

#### Shodh Marathi Manacha:

College hosted a mega event called '*Shodh Marathi Manacha*" (Discovering Marathi Mind). It was the only program of its kind organized so far. The people from Maharashtra who achieved highest degree of excellence and position in the fields like politics, education, research, art, music, business, entreprenurship, corporate sector, etc were invited for the gathering. There had been excellent session on the success stories of the people. The sessions on success stories recounted by famous entreprenuers and businesspersons received a huge response. People from many countries participated in the event. It helped college to bring about interactions of the people with the faculty and students in the college. Ten thousand people attended the event.

#### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

- Bringing out educational and cultural development of rural population.
- Providing standard facilities of hostel accommodation, physical education and value education.
- Bringing out social transformation through education.
- Creating resources and utilizing them for educational upliftment of common people.
- Promoting intellectual, ethical and cultural development of society.
- Imparting technical and professional education to increase employability and economic development.
- Creating a wide-spread educational network seeking mass participation in education.

The major characteristic of Deogiri College is **commitment to quality &** excellence with social and environmental sensitivity.

• The institution has been promoting quality education especially for the students hailing from rural areas. It has been conferred the status College with Potential for Excellence by UGC on 15/10/2010. It validates and encourages institution's mission for offering quality education to socially and economically backward classes and students hailing from rural areas. It also addresses social needs, access, equity and quality which are embodied in mission statement.



- Institution's emphasis on enhancing infrastructure is in line with idea of providing adequate space to learners in the campus. It has resulted in bringing about cultural and educational development of students. Institution provides hostel facilities for both boys and girls. Hostels accommodate 1052 students *in toto*. As the necessity of hostel is high for girl students from rural areas, the institution has always emphasized on enhancing hostel facilities for girl students. A new girls' hostel with accomodation capacity of 500 is proposed and a construction plan has been chalked out.
- The variety of courses embodying technical and professional aspects of education signify vision for future. The courses like Bachelor of Vocation in Jewellery Designing and Gemology and Multimedia and Animation signify the need for radical changes in traditional way of knowledge aquisition.
- Institution's constant support and encouragement to activities of NCC, NSS, sports and games, culturals programmes results into providing diversity of students with opportunities to achieve excellence in the fields. It is due to it college team grabs the Best Cultural Group Award at University level Youth Festival among the 396 affiliated colleges to the university. NCC and NSS units at college have been acknowledged as one of the best units under the affiliated university. The Department of Physcial Education and Sports has bagged as many as 410 prizes in the last five years. It is a matter of great hnonour for the college that the department has 13 Chatrapati Award Winners to its credit. It is one of the highest award given by Govt. of Maharashtra to a sports person for his/her outstanding performance in sports or games. All activities always have inclination towards ethical and cultural development and also indicate committment to value education.

## 6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

M.S.P. Mandal's Deogiri Collge has well-defined quality policy and action plans. The top Management i.e. Executive Council of M.S.P. Mandal, Local Governing Council, Principal and faculty play a vital role in the design and implementation of quality plans and policy.

As a socially committed educational institute, Deogiri College is part of the large network of about 100 educational institutes like primary, secondary, higher secondary schools at higher educational institutes at senior, engineering, law, pharmasy, polytechnic, management level. Most of the institues are situated in rural areas where need of quality education is high. Deogiri College being an important link in this network and task of imparting quality education is driven by the vision and mission is answerable to the Executive Council of Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Aurangabad.



- At the central level, a robust, effective structure has been set in place to ensure that quality in terms of service is converted to excellence in each of its units of higher education. Executive Council also ensures the implementation of vision and mission of M.S.P. Mandal while insisting on its relevance to the changing time and circumstances. The council works as a policy making agency.
- At the local level, Deogiri College has a Governing Council consisting of 11 members of which Principal is member secretary. The Presdent and the Secretary of the institution are the members of the council. It has three representatives from teaching staff and one representative from non-teaching staff. The three local members representing different fields of the area are nominated by the management. It also has a representative of management. The meeting of Local Governing Council takes place twice a year
- At college level, three Vice-Principals assist the Principal. The registrar, coordinator of IQAC, librarian and physical director form a core of Principal's management of college activities. All heads of department and the chairpersons of different committees further assist it.
- The Student Council, which consists of staff advisors and student council's office bearer periodically, meets and makes relevant suggestions to improve the institutional systems and process.
- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is a key unit in implementing quality enhancement and assurance measures of the college. Principal plays a vital role in bringing about coordination among various committees, departments, offices in the college.

#### **\*** Roles Played in Quality Policy Making:

Though the Management plays an important role in making of quality policy, other stakeholders also have their share in quality policy making. The Principal conveys feedback from various stakeholders, requirements presented by various committees and HoDs and demands made by students, to the Management. Besides it, IQAC becomes the most significant agency regarding reviewing the quality issues of various activities at the college. The Principal performs an important role of catalyst between the Management and various stakeholders for realizing various quality issues in the form of positive results. The responsibility of reviewing all quality issues is carried out by all componenets in the management structure.

It is in this way two-way information and communication system from departmental level to the top level of management is in place to execute quality policy and plans of the institution.



#### 6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring :

### > The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

The institution has clearly stated objectives implementation of its vision and mission. Keeping in view the commitment in vision and mission, institution systematically plans college activities. It is done on both levels of short term and long term planning. Every year academic activities calendar is prepared. Up-gradation of infrastructure, enhancement of research culture, hostel facilities, and environmental friendly initiatives, enhancement of library services, formalizing activities of Alumni Association, strengthening feedback mechanism, organization of professional training programs for teaching and non-teaching staff and inviting more companies for campus placement are the key issues taken into consideration while fulfilling the vision of the institution.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

The various issues as mentioned above are taken into account when committees chalk out their plans for various activities. Besides it, HoDs also contribute in executing plans that incorporate into the institutional strategic plan. Planning Board, Admission Committee, Library Committee, Placement & Councelling Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Student Council, Woman Impowerment Cell, etc work in coordination with HoDs and thus various curricular and co-curricular activities are carried out. IQAC plays an important role on coordination level.

#### > Interaction with stakeholders:

Regular interactions with various stakeholders of the institution at formal and informal meetings create a notion of common responsibility, affinity and ownership. The galaxy of variety of stakeholder who interact on different level, help the institution in improving its standards. Interactions with stakeholders are also sought through the following programmes continuously being held, such as:

- Alumni Association is registered and its meetings are conducted regularly.
- Meeting of parents with the Principal, Vice-Principals, admission committee members and HoDs take place at the time of admission and throughout the year.
- Principal and members of LGC interact with students on regular basis.
- IQAC has two expert members representing specialized area, who contribute in functioning of IQAC by their innovative suggestions.
- The Placement and & Career Counselling Cell keeps itself in contact with different companies and industries and their recruitment drives are held at



college. In turn, they offer valuable feedback on various issues like infrastructure, syllabi and requirement of skill development.

- Parent-Teachers meeting at departmental and institutional levels.
- Former teachers of the college, distinguished alumni are frequently invited to the college on various occasions. Interactions with them offer good insight into strengthening the services for students at college.

### Proper support for policy and planning through need analyses, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders:

A regular need analysis is carried out in the college by various committees suh as the Purchase & Finance Committee, Library Committee, Research Advisory Committee, Planning Board and Building Committee under the leadership of the Principal, the Vice-Principals and even the members of LGC at least once a year. There have been various sources to recognize needs of the stakeholders. Consultation, research and feedback have been important tools in this regard. Feedback is taken on library, syllabus, college campus, teachers and hostel services. Feedback is also received from alumni and parents. These efforts result into identifying various problems and need for training for studnets, teachers and non-teaching faculty.

## Reinforcing the culture of excellence & championing organizational change:

Based on the feedback received from stakeholders on various aspects, perspective plans of the institution, SWOC analysis carried by each department and IQAC, the college designs a proper structure for further reforms and innovations in order to sustain excellence. Following aspects suggest and are the key issues in achieving and sustaining excellence and championing organizational changes:

- Outstanding participation of teachers and students in research and field work.
- Effective teaching-learning assisted by ICT in smart classrooms.
- Extension and enhancement of library services as a learning reosurce.

- Introduction of B.Voc programmes and 17 short term certificate courses under Career Development Program.
- Introduction of Sanskrit subject at UG level and Mathematics and Geology at PG level.
- Computerization of library record.
- Provision of Central Research Laboratory.
- Appointment of qulified Training and Placement Officer.
- Special budget provision for departments like Dramatics and Music.



- Lecture series by Chartered Accountants for Commerce students on entrepreneurship development.
- Construction of Outdoor Stadium.

It is in this way the institution guage the changes taking place in different fields and reviews and redesigns its policies in order to keep pace with changes on technological, industrial, research and service level.

- Teaching and non-teaching staff is given representation of Local Governing Council ensuring their participation on management issues. The Academic Council that comprises the Principal, Vice-Principals, HoDs and IQAC Coordinator plans and monitors the work of syllabus design of short term courses and their implementation.
- Management remains persistent about initiatives regarding training the faculty and students in use of new teaching-learning technologies. It eventually results into enhancing personality and improving leadership qualities of both staff and students.

#### 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The College grooms leadership at all the three levels:

- Management and Administration
- Teaching and Non Teaching Staff
- Students

**Management and Administration**: Principal is selected as per the eligibility criteria laid down by UGC, state government and affiliating University. Proper care is taken while selecting a candidate for the post of Principal. The Principal plays an important role of a leader that connects college staff, LGC and Executive Council. Besides it, three members from teaching faculty and one member from non-teaching faculty are sellected as members of LGC as per Maharshtra University Act, 1994.

**Teaching and Non Teaching Staff:** Deogiri College has promising resources for teaching and non teaching staff to groom their leadership. Teaching staff leads the various committees on the college and University level. They also have gained quite a good experience in organizing various events at college level. HoDs do make various events organized by their departments quite fruitful. Prof. A. V. Tejankar, Head, Dept. of Geology is the Vice President of



the Teachers' Association under Dr. B.A.M. University, Aurangabad. He also worked as a member of Pay Fixation Committee for the teachers under the affiliating university. Prof. Dilip Khairnar represents the Pre-Budget Committee as a member at University Level.

**Student Leadership:** There are many activities like conferences, workshops, literary association, motivational lectures, where students get opportunity to chart out the structure of the program and execute it. Students represent college committees like Library Committee, IQAC, Cultural Committee, Women Cell, etc besides the Students Council where a student is elected as General Secretary from all class representatives. Management also helps students financially to participate programmes on development of leadership. There has been good number of students enrolling for such type of programmes from NCC and NSS units at college. Different new channels in Hindi and regional language also visit the college and organize a events where students are encouraged to speak, express their opinions on different social, political and educational issues.

## 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Deogiri College has a functionally decentralized structure of decision-making and management information system. Principal of subsidarity and collective responsibility are few of the most salient features of decentralized governance system of college. Keeping in view the large number of students studying on the campus, it becomes essential and necessary to provide operational autonomy to departments and other units of the institution. The existence of three Vice-Principals representing different disciplines helps the Principal work effectively because of decentralization of authority. Besides it, the Management delegates the authority and the Principal provides operational autonomy to the various units while directing and coordinating them.

Following are the details of various committees and association through which the delegation of authority and provision of operational autonomy are implemented.

**Co-ordination Committee:** This committee is headed by the Vice Principal. Its main work is to coordinate the activities of all the departments, head of the departments, and general programmes organized in college campus. The committee also seeks coordination among non-teaching, teaching staff and students.

**Discipline Committee:** The committee carries out responsibility of maintenance of general discipline, preventing ragging, as well as for initiating disciplinary action when required.

**Research Committee:** The committee receives complete freedom as to examine and promote research activities on the college campus. Accordingly it proposes need for research in the form minor and major research projects from different grant providing agencies. It also proposes for enhancement of laboratories and infrastructural development. The management responds to the suggestions positively.



**Purchase Committee:** This committee plays an important role in finalizing purchases for different departments and units at college.

**Library Committee:** Library Committee constantly reviews the services provided by library and its staff. It aims at making the library services student friendly. It proposes certain changes for optimum utilization of the library.

**IQAC:** Internal Quality and Assurance Cell receives more operational autonomy as to implement various programmes and policies in order to enhance quality of different units at college. IQAC has become a competent centre for decentralized governance at college level. It is here many of the schemes pertaining internal quality and its assurance are planned and a mechanism is developed and implemented. Effectiveness and sole concentration on the issue of quality and it assurance meets with positive acknowledgement by top and local level management.

**Alumni Association:** College has a registered alumni association. It has well defined and well structured body of its members. Alumni hailing from various fields in society represent it. It proves to be an independent body offering valuable suggestions on various issues pertaining to quality enhancement and development of college.

The college essentially is managed at the level of each department. The HoDs and their colleagues are the key factors in the management. They plan, design and implement the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. It is done in close consultation with the Principal. In this way, all these functional oragans are accountable to the Principal.

## 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The college promotes a culture of participative management. The Principal and the three Vice-Principals share academic leadership and administrative responsibilities.

Effective coordination is sought between Management and the Principal for better execution of various practices. The Principal is a member secretary of Local Governing Committee. The Principal is administrative head of the college. The Principal shares powers and delegates the responsibilities for implementation process, to the Vice-Principals and Registrar for academic and administrative activities.



The four-tier system comprising the Management Council, Academic Council, Administrative Wing and Student Council ensure that the quality of teachinglearning on the campus is enhanced.

The Principal functions through the academic and administrative wing. Three Vice-Principals and IQAC work in close line with the Principal. They form a golden medium between the Principal and Academic and Administrative Wing. HoDs, librarian, physical director, chairpersons of committees, hostel rectors & the registrar coordinate autonomously administrative, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, in consultation with the Principal. They receive assistance from student representatives. IQAC does planning and evaluation for the college and meets periodically throughout the year. At the level department, HoDs are encouraged to hold meetings on different issues; right from the issue of syllabus and changes in it and planning of teaching work to the evaluation of students. The meetings are held as and when required regarding implementation and organization of certain activities like national conferences, workshop, exibitions, lecture series, celebration, etc. In this work, help of students and faculty from other departments is sought.

Thus non-teaching staff, studnets and the faculty participate actively in the execuation and mangaement of various activities on the campus.

The advantages like the President of the institution being the Ex. Cabine Minister of in Govt. of Maharashtra, Secretary of the institution being an MLA of the graduates' constituency, huge galaxy of college's alumni, extensive extension services, close association with academic associations & organizations, frequent visits to college by eminent personalities in different fields from the country and abroad as well, result into participative management and positive outcomes.

#### 6.2 Strategy Development and Development

## 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the quality policy of the institution pronounces that the College is committed to pursue high standards of excellence in all our endeavours by focusing on teaching-learning, research, extension, administration, management, sports and games and cultural activities while promoting a culture of research, students' all round development and commitment to quality, excellence and adequate services to students especially those hailing from rural areas. Awareness about social responsibilities and execution of high ethical standards are the most salient features of the quality policy of the institution.



There is a systematic mechanism to develop and execute the policy on overall development and excellence. The stakeholders of the college contribute in constituting quality policy for the institution. There are internal and external stakeholders who play distinctive role in providing valuable suggestions in order to frame quality policy, additions in it and effective execution of it. The major part of the quality policy adheres to the vision and mission of the institution, which refer to higher social responsibilities of providing education to socially and economically backward classes and areas. However, quality policy is always strengthened by inclusion of new ways of strategies and methodologies while keeping in view the changes on the level of technology, society, class, economy, education, industry and values.

What uniforms the quality policy of the college is strict adherence to excellence at all levels. Various events, programmes and strategies are structured to enhance teaching and learning experience. It involves preplanned teaching, transparent internal evaluation, remedial teaching, coordination among various units is sought to bring about positive result from students in sports & games, cultural activities, NCC, NSS, public speaking and academic activities. Besides IQAC, there are other units like Management, Principal. Vice-Principals, Academic Council, different committees and external members representing different committees participate in planning and reviewing quality policy and they see that the quality policies are deployed in accordance with the stated quality policy.

## 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Yes, the college has a perspective plan of development worked out in a systematic manner in the year 2010 - 2011. It is a long term plan for next five years. M.S. P. Mandal's College Development Office (CDO) former Principal Hon. R.T.Deshmukh takes active participation in designing the perspective plan for college. He is assisted by the Principal, teaching and administrative staff of the college.

It has the following structure:

- **Part I:** It consists of vision, mission, core values, objectives and strategies in the areas of education, knowledge generation, management and extension.
- **Part II:** It consists of perspective plan for each criterion of higher education being imparted on the campus like curriculum, research, teaching, learning, evaluation, student support services and strategies for their progression, their contribution in cultural and sport activities, infrastructural development, innovations, best practices, contribution to social cause, outreach and extension programmes, campus placement drives, etc.




- **Part III:** This part deals with implementation of the plan and monitoring mechanism designed for it.
- Part IV: It deals with department-wise perspective plan.

The perspective plan sees many changes with the change of the time. However it always enriched with positivity of the change on the grounds like technology, increasing number of students, trends in research and advancement in industries, etc. It results in better understanding of things to be planned and executed for each stakeholder.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

### **The Internal Organizational Structure**



• **Executive Council:** It is the top management level. M.S. P. Mandal's general body elects Executive Council comprising of 21 members. It is the main body that authenticates the policies and programmes of the institutions. It looks



after the smooth functioning of all the institutions under M.S. P. Mandal, Aurangabad. Executive Council is reponsible for:

- To tender the vision and mission of the institute through various activities of its constituents.
- Collective recruitment of institute under M.S.P. Mandal.
- To design quality policy and direct its execution.
- $\circ$  To signify and channelize the future advancement of all institutes under it.
- To design and implement an inclusive management as to bring about cluster development of all the units and stakeholders of the institutes.
- To look after development of physical infrastructure.
- Local Governing Council: Like the Executive Council, it is also headed by the President of M. S. P. Mandal, Aurangabad. It comprises of three members including the President, Secretary, a representative of the management and three other members representing different fields of the area and three representatives from teaching staff and one from non-teaching staff. Principal is the member secretary of the council. The members of LGC frequently visit the college and review the functioning of the college. However, they have formal meetings twice a year. Most of the proposals are planned, discussed and sanctioned in LGC. Principal plays the role of conveying issues and concerns as informed by various committees and sections like departments.

#### LMC possesses following powers and authoritities:

- To prepare the budget and financial statements.
- Recommend to the management the creation of teaching and other posts.
- To determine the programme of instruction and internal evaluation and to discuss the progress of studies in the college.
- Formulate proposals of new expenditure not provided for in the college budget.
- Consider and make recommendations on the inspection if any;
- Consider and make recommendations on the report of the local inquiry committee, if any.

**The Academic Council:** it is headed by the Principal and consists of Vice-Principals, HoDs and the IQAC coordinator. It meets quarterly to review and plan the institutional programmes and procedures. It functions in the following way:

- To evaluate the curriculam designed by the university and monitor its implementation along with adequate infrastructural creation and development.
- To monitor timely completion of teaching-learning and test-tutorial programmes.



- $\circ$   $\,$  To propose need for new courses and invite proposals for them.
- $\circ$  To evaluate the proposals and sanction them.
- To propose and plan co-curricular and extra curricular activities.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell: It is constituted as per the directions by NAAC. As figured in the organogram, it has vital role to play in bringing about coordination among all the constituents of the institute. It is a key medium through which creation, sustenance and enhancement of quality and excellence is ensured. It is always in consultation with all committees, cells, HoDs regarding effective organization of various events and documentation of such events and programmes. The IQAC organizes professional and personal development programmes for both the faculty and the students.
- **Coordination Committee:** It is represented by the three Vice-Principals. The main work of the committee is to bring about coordination among various units in the college. Its work becomes essential especially in case of inter-departmental and multi-disciplinary activities. It plays an important role in bringing coordination among library, the Department of Sports and Physical Education, Cultural Activities Committee and units like NSS and NCC.
- **Hostel Committee:** It is headed by a member from management. The rectors of boys' and girls' hostel are the members of the committee. It is also represented by teaching and non-teaching staff of the college. It looks after the work of hostel and proper functioning of its services.
- **The Alumni Association:** The institute has got an active alumni association who actively contribute in better functioning of the institute with all its expertise and representation from different fields.
- The Administration Wing: It takes care of all the administrative matters pertaining to the faculty and students. Registrar monitors the functioning of various units of the office. It is responsible to manage and facilitate human resources and expedite execution of duty. Registrar is assisted by the Office Superintendent, accountant, store keeper and others.
- **Committees:** Different committees play an important role in execution of responsibilities and activities on the campus. It is through the committees, the college seeks decentralization of power structure.



### 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

#### • Teaching & Learning

College adopts different strategies for quality improvement regarding teaching and learning. Introduction of new programmes, like B.A. in Sanskrit, M.Sc in Mathematics, Geology, and Bachelor of Vocation in subject of Geology and Computer Science, is one of the essential strategies of the institute. College successfully implemented UGC sponsored merged schemes, like Career Counselling and Equal Opportunity Centre. College also commenced 17 short term certificate courses under Career Development Programme line with UGC's Career Oriented Programmes.

College augments the necessary infrastructure for increased number of courses and makes provision for infrastructural development for possible changes on different levels. As a part of this strategy, college has developed ICT enabled classrooms and constructed new classrooms on Arts Building. Audio-visual aids available at ICT enabled classroom help in enhancing the quality of teaching-learning process.

- Student Mentoring System: It has been observed that formal teachinglearning process requires more efforts to solve different problems of learners. It must be assisted by personal counseling and exchange of ideas on various personal levels between students and teachers. Keeping this in view, the college has developed a mechanism called student mentoring system. Students studying a particular subject register themselves with the teacher teaching the subject. The teachers offer all kind of help including personal. Students mainly seek help on academic matter. It has proved very helpful in case of girl students. It results into continuity and improvement in teaching-learning process. 2137 students are benifited by the this system.
- Extension of Language Laboratory: It has been the part of the strategy that language learning should be assisted by technology. Besides this, it proves helpful to all faculty students to improve their communication skills. Accordingly other laboratories are also strengthened. Language laboratory is expanded with new software with 25 consoles of ORELL.
- Books and Sports, WiFi Facility: College makes adequate addition to the existing number of books in the library. During the last four years, 12324 books (including text books, reference books and journals' bound volumes) are added costing Rs. 4140042. College built an outdoor play-ground of size 100 X113 M. costing Rs 47,00000. College provides students with limited access to internet through WiFi through which students can access college repository like e-books and video lectures.



#### Research & Development

The college has a policy that encourages its entire faculty to take up research projects, pursue their doctoral studies. The management of the college insists on constant engagement of faculty in quality research. College organizes subject-wise workshops and orientation programmes in different subjects on the subject of research and research methodology. It also organizes extensive week long orientation programmes on research and research methodology. College has 10 University approved Ph.D research centres. There are total 18 Ph.D guides and 122 research students are studying for their doctoral studies under their supervision and 37 students have received the degree of Ph.D.

Due to the creation research friendly ambience on the campus, teachers have succeeded in fetching the grant of one crore and eighty lakhs in the last four years from different granting agencies like UGC and DST. The faculties at the college have published as many as 341 papers at national and international level.

- Faculty of all streams is encouraged to take up research activities in fundamental and essential area in their respective subjects. Teachers work on key areas like DNA, fingerprinting, cancer cells, taxanomy, chemoinformatics, applied sociology, international relations, science fiction, electronic censors, hydrogeology, artificial recharge, recycling of plastic, etc.
- Teachers are provided with financial support in the form of separate research labs, central research laboratory to persue their research in the form of minor and major projects. College signs MoU with other institutes like Paul Herbert Centre for DNA Barcoding and Biodiersity Study, Dr. B.A.M. University, Aurangabad for collaborative research work and providing research facilities which are not available with the college.
- Teachers are given study leave under FIP.
- The departments are given financial assistance by the college to organize orientation, training programmes and workshops on research methodology in the college every year.
- The management of the college honours faculty for their outstanding contribution in research activities. Teachers are encouraged to present papers at national and international seminars, workshop and are provided with registration fees.
- Adoption of latest technology like online survey and use of software like Discovery Studio, Aurguslab, Rastop, Chimera and Bioperl & Biopython, GIS, Global Mapper, etc.
- Following are the details of the financial support provided by the college to teachers to presents paper in conference and seminars.

#### • Community Engagement:

College constantly feels and remains committed for social responsibilities. Besides the contribution by NSS and NCC units at college in socially oriented programmes, college does organize myriad events and programmes contributing to social cause. It works in line with the vision and mission of M.S. P. Mandal, that adheres to transforming social change through education. College received the first prize and cash prize of rupees one lakh from Govt. of Maharashtra on17th April, 2013 for its outstanding contribution in the work entitled "*Jagar Janivancha*" an initiative to save girl child and negate female feticide. College organizes various programmes in this regard on gender sensitization. Observing the dire need of hostels for girs students, the institute undertook extension of hostels. Realizing importance of hostel for assurance of girls' hailing from villages, college has sanctioned new girls' hostel with capacity of 500. Following are some of the contributions made by college in this regard:

- College library provides its services to an Old People's Home named *Matoshri* at outskirt of the city.
- College staff contributed to the relief fund to the drought affected area in the region of Marathwada by donating Rs.368744 in the year 2012-13 and Rs. 392824 in the year 2013 -14.
- College adopted villages during the drought and provided facilities of drinking water.
- College has signed MoU with the Central Bus Station and Government Hospital and Training Institute Aurangabad through which NSS unit takes up cleanliness programme at their premises.
- College library donates books to the needy institutes that include college and public libraries.

#### • Human Resource Management:

Deogiri College consciously attempts to take up different programmes to develop human resources available on the campus. Organization of different training and orientation programmes is done in order to develop the skill of staff and students. Variety of programmes is organized on the issues like soft skill development, entrepreneurship development, research attitude, stress management, yog shibir, motivational talk, etc. The College has also commenced a lecture series entitled '*Dnyanprabodhini*' where teachers from the college give talk on the subject chosen by them. Teachers also select the topic of their presentation in various seminar and conferences.



#### • Industry Interaction:

Curricula provided by the University in the subjects like Commerce, Bio-Technology, B.B.A, B.C.A, Computer Science, Chemistry, Electronics, English and Psychology is enhanced by its practical implication through close interaction with industry and agencies. Study tours to visit industrial areas and prominent projects are a regular feature of teaching activity. College is a part of Tie-Up between the University and INFOSYS, Bangalore. Through this programme, three teachers of the college have been trained to prepare students for similar industries like that of INFOSYS. It resulted into increasing the campus placement of college for INFOSYS and other companies as well. Dept. of Psychology organizes psychological testing programmes for the workers in the industries for counseling on stress management. Dept. of Commerce oranizes a lecture seriesi in which chartered accountants, corporates, entreprenuers, etc. address students on better opportunities in the field of commerce. Likewise, Dept. of Chemistry and Dept. of Biotechnolgy have close interactions with industries. There are MoUs formally signed between the instituion and the industries like Animation Studio Jingle-Toons Pvt. Ltd, Matrix Fine Solutions Pvt. Ltd., Endurance Technology Pvt. Ltd. Waluj, Aurangabad, etc.

Tie-Up with industries and training sessions by experts from industries are the regular features of the curricula of the courses.

## 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

College receives feedback on various issues related to teaching, learning, library services, campus experience, hostel services, curricula, etc. Feedback Committee analyses the feedback and submits reports to the Principal. Principal ensures that adequate information is provided to the top management and stakeholders. Principal's frequent interactions with different committee members and HoDs brings him idea about teaching and learning process on the campus and also enables him to instruct the faculty in proper manner. The Principal informs major issues from the feedback analyses to the top management and he ensures that positive decisions are taken.

## 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The Management does pay close attention to quality issues and insist on effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes. It ensures all staff realizes and shares the Vision and Mission of the college. This is done through a well-defined and designed series of professional development programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff.

Every year the orientation programmes on the issues of effective teaching, new methodologies of teaching, effective use of modern technologies in teaching and research, new approaches in evaluation, management of eresources at library, new trends in record keeping, etc are sponsored by the management. Management also sponsors week long intensive orientation programmes on effective teaching. It also offers freeship to the wards of staff.

Management's formal and informal discussions with HoDs and staff bring about the idea of collective responsibility and voluntary involvement of the staff. Management encourages all staff of the college to provide helping hand to the department that organizes event or program like national or international conference. It not only increases effectiveness and efficiency of the process but also develops a sense of being one part of the institutional process among the staff.

## 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, the affiliating university makes a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution. Deogiri College hosted a meet on autonomy. It was participated by members of management, teachers and Principals from five different colleges under M.S.P. Mandal and effective discussion took place on the issue.

Deogiri College possesses potentials to be autonomous on various parameters. Management invites panel discussions on the issue and seeks opinion from stakeholders and the representatives of different fields. Pending position of



vacancies of teaching staff due to governmental technical issues, is one of key factors in delay in advancement on the part of the college in applying for autonomy.

## 6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

Deogiri College has a formal mechanism to ensure that complains are immediately attended to and resolved positively. There are two Grievances and Redressal Cells for staff and students. The Grienvances and Redressal Cell for staff is headed by the Secretary of M.S.P. Mandal and it does have representation from teaching and non-teaching faculty and Grievances and Redressal Cell for students is headed by the Principal and students have representation in it. The grievances are promptly presented to the concerned authority. The promptness allows everyone to feel free to present their problems to the authority. If the grievances are not addressed, they are taken to the Principal. Principal directs the matter to the Grievance and Redressal Committee. The top management represents the cell. Generally there is a very healthy and positive relationship prevailing on the college campus and no serious complains have been lodged. However there are general complaints regarding the evaluation, delay in results declaration and admission criteria, which come under University's authority; enquiries are made to the University authorities and possible solutions are sought.

The college also has a policy for addressing to complaints. Stakeholders directly represent their concerns to the Principal and most of them are resolved positively. The Principal seeks prompt coordination among Vice-Principals, HoDs, heads of committees and coordinator of IQAC on grievances. Serious grievances are referred to the Grievance Committee. After interactions and disucussions at the appropriate level, corrective actions are taken.

## 6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The college has a mechanism for receiving and analyzing student feedback on institutional performance. It covers teachers' performance, library services, administrative services, campus facilities, evaluation, hostel facilities, etc. Feedback Committee looks after the work of feedback collection, its analyses and reports it to the Principal. The Principal in consultation with the concerned authority takes prompt, appropriate and corrective policy decisions. Major issues are communicated to the Management.

#### 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

## 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enchance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

As the college aims at delivery of excellent services, proper care is always taken for the professional development of the teaching and non-teaching staff. Following are the key issues in the policy of the college for development of professionalism among teaching and non-teaching staff.

- Annual programmes of professional development are organized for teaching and non-teaching staff. They feature new methodologies, use of new technologies effectively and understanding and management of information technology.
- The college is an ISO certified one. It has helped in enhancing the professional development of both teaching and non-teaching staff. Interactions of the staff with the team of ISO auditors do results in introduction to new and innovative ways of record keeping and delivery of services. ISO audit has proved more effective for enhancing preofessional development of administrative services.
- College has evolved a friendly work environment that allows the staff to work effectively especially new staff. They are supported and facilitated by senior staff. Besides it, they are encouraged to attend professional development programmes.



- Regular formal and informal meetings of non-teaching staff are organized with the Principal to resolve various issues and insistence is made on the issue of effective work culture.
- The college provides encouragement, support and financial help to departments to organize professional development programmes annually.
- Library staff is encouraged for training in advanced tools and technologies in library services.
- The college encourages teachers to attend general orientation, refresher and short term courses conducted by various Universities and UGC Academic Staff Colleges. In the last four year, 42 long term orientation, refresher programmes, workshops were attended by faculty and 50 short term professional development programmes were attended by the teaching faculty.
- In the last four year as many as 32 orientation, workshop and professional development programmes for teachers are organized.
- The college also encourages its staff to participate in seminar, conferences and workshop on national and international level. It results not only in their professional development but also in strengthening their personal network of relationship with their counterpart in other institutes. College provides financial assistance to staff for attending conferences. There were **373 paper presented** at different levels of conferences, workshops and seminars and **669** conferences, workshops and seminars are **attended** by the college faculties.

## 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The institution believes in idea that the delivery of quality education and learners' friendly environment is possible only with the proper up-gradation of qualities of the stakeholders of the institution. Faculty empowerment through training, retraining and professional development programmes is done regularly. The need based programmes of training are organized for teaching and non-teaching staff. Different training programmes for library staff, clerks, staff looking after online admission work, account staff are organized. M.S.P. Mandal announces a schedule of training for the staff in the beginning each academic year and such programmes are arranged throughout the year.

Keeping in view, increase in number of students, programmes, feedback, SWOC analyses, need for personal and professional learning and development



is identified. Such needs are addressed under the guidance of the Principal and the IQAC Coordinator. Following decisions are outcome of such plans and analyses.

- Providing for the staff to attend orientation and refresher course on the basis of requirement under Career Advancement Scheme stipulated by UGC and requirement of training on basic and advanced pedagogy in the concerned subject.
- Regular external audit by ISO 9001 for both academic and administrative services.
- Setting up of four research laboratories.
- Construction of Central Research Laboratory.
- Extension of language laboratory featuring learning modules for professionals.
- Regular organization of University level workshop on revised and new syllabus.
- Encouragement to faculty to attend programmes like **Train the Trainer Progamme** under the initiative entitled **Project Genesis** offered by INFOSYS, Pune Campus.
- Purchase of new books, journals, periodicals and e-resources ensures advance learning at college.
- Encouraging and welcoming visits by eminent scholars and academicians from the country and abroad to seek fruitful interactions with them.
- Offering financial assistance to teachers participating in national and international level workshops and conferences.
- Honouring teachers on their completion of Ph.D studies, outstanding research work and successful completion of 25 years of their services as teachers on every annual day of the college.
- Design of new software to collect academic data of teachers on line.
- Redesign the college website to order to make it more user friendly and offering easy access to e-resources available with college library.

In this way, Deogiri College takes proper care in providing learning oncampus opportunities to its staff. It results positively in various academic and administrative areas like knowledge sharing, teaching, learning, mentoring, research, sports, extension, participation in conference, seminars, campus placement, and infrastructural development. There is constant addition in number of computers. All departments are provided computers with internet connectivity to make teaching-learning process more effective.



#### 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The college evaluates faculty on the basis of Self Appraisal Report submitted by each faculty at the end of each academic year. A committee headed by a Vice Principal receives the reports every year from IQAC and analyses the performance of teachers based on the following categories: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation related strategies; Co-curricular, Extension, Professional Development Activities and Contribution in Research. The college regularly obtains feedback on teachers' performance by students. There are various parameters taken into consideration while receiving feedback on teachers' performance.

Feedback Committee analyses the feedback and communicates its analyses to the Principal. Principal communicates with concerned teachers about their performance. The Principal encourages strengthening of the positives points of their performance and suggests them to work on weaknesses.

# 6.3.4 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The college has several welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff.

- Financial assistance to participate conference, workshop and seminars.
- Staff Credit Society providing loan facilities on two levels i.e. regular and emergency. There have been **1,160** loan cases during the last four year totaling loan amount of **Rs. 217,063,190/-**
- Concession in fees to the wards of teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Provision of leave to faculty to pursue doctoral studies under FIP. Dr. Balaji Navle, Asst. Prof. of English completed his Ph.D studies under FIP from S. R. T. M. University, Nanded during 2009 to 2011.
- Duty leave for officially sanctioned training programmes and workshops.
- Duty leave for attending orientation, refresher and short term courses at UGC academic staff colleges. Total number of **60** teaching staff completed **92** orientation, refresher and short term programmes during the last four years.
- College provides financial support to faculty to present papers in various seminars and conferences. In the last four year, teachers received **Rs. 1,51,683** as a financial support.

## 6.3.5 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

#### • Major decisions taken:

- Special software is designed by the Department of Computer Science to collect academic data of the staff.
- Short term certificate courses are introduced and it gave opportunity to teaching staff to design curriculum for such courses.
- **Dnyanprabodhini**, a lecture series, has been started. It is an initiative to offer the college teachers opportunity to present their ideas on a certain topic that bears context and relevence in today's world. It enhances their presentation skills.

#### • Improvement in the infrastructure:

- Every department is equipped with computers and internet connectivity, provision of research labs, ICT enabled classrooms, etc.
- Financial assistance is provided to teachers participating conferences, workshops and seminars.



## 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The heritage of M.S.P. Mandal exhibiting its commitment for social cause is realized through quality performance by Deogiri College. It has been the best institute in the region. Its NAAC grade with CGPA of 3.39 is greater than any other institute in the region. It is itself an attraction for the perspective faculty. However, the institution advertises the vacancies in prominent newspapers, institutional websites.

Faculty selection is done with utmost discretion, adhering to the norms laid down by UGC, state Govt. and affiliating university. Selection are done on pure quality basis.

**Retention** : As functional autonomy is given to the faculty, the college becomes a healthy place to work in. Motivating management, well nurtured research culture, excellent participation of students in learning activities, healthy ambience, cooperative teaching and non-teaching staff, financial assistance to the wards of staff, appreciation, encouragement, honour and family like feeling help retaining faculty on the campus. #### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college has a well-defined financial and infrastructural development policy. The Finance and Purchase Committee carefully looks into the mobilization and effective use of available financial resources. Annual budgeting and auditing of its account is a regular system of the college. Budgeting and auditing are the forms of understanding where planning meets its realization. College has its mechanism of short and long term planning. In annual budget, long term planning is taken into consideration as to fulfill the promises made by the institution in its vision and mission statement. It always aims at utilization of funds in the most suitable and effective manner.

#### **Internal Budget & Audit:**

- College invites requirements from all departments and accordindgly prepares budget for them.
- Finance and Purchase Committee works on the details of the budget.
- It sanctions the budget and presents it to the Principal and Local Governing Council.
- The LGC approve it.
- The LGC are the authority for cheking of the bills and expenditure.
- Internal audit by the LGC.

Senior accoutant is in charge of maintaining accounts and management of the funds. Financial resources are available mainly from the UGC, Government and Management. HoDs submit their requirements and evaluating the strengths and need of the department Finance and Purchase Committee sanctions the funds. There are different issues like number students, importance of the subject, research of the facutly, placement record, number of programmes being offered by the department, etc affect the quantity and frequency of funds. Management ensures the effective and proper use of financial resources. All transactions are done through bank and all expenditure, recurring and nonrecurring are incurred through cheques.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

#### **Internal and External Audit:**

• LGC and the members of Executive Council often check the proper utilization of financial resources. The Finance Committee and Management evaluate the methods and priorities of utilization of the resources. Internal audit of all financial transactions and resources by a competent Chartered Accountant firm named **Sherkar and Co** is done by the institution.



There are three external agencies that undertake financial audit of the college.

#### **External Audit :**

- <u>Zilla Parishad Audit</u>: This audit generally aims at the utilization of financial resources at junior college. The audit also comprises the utilizations of senior college.
- Joint Director, Higher Education: It is one of the important agencies that carries out audit of college.
- <u>Auditor Gerneral's (AG) Audit</u>: It is a final external audit done by governamental agency; Auditor General's (AG) Office, Nagpur, Maharashtra.

#### **Periodicity:**

• Internal and external audit of the account are carried out every year by the above mentioned agencies. Government schedules audit by AG's office. The last audit by AG' office was carried out in 2009 – 2010. However, competent Charatered Accountant firm, ISO 9001 and Joint Director of Higher Education audit accounts of college on a regular basis.

#### **Major Audit Objections:**

• The recent external audits carried out by Governmental and nongovernamental agencies are the proof of effective and efficient use of the available financial resources. It is also certified by the agencies that there are no major irregularities with respect to the financial management of the institution.

#### **Recommendations and compliance:**

- It is seen that the college has opened the department-wise accounts as current expenses and capital expenses. It is suggested that instead of debiting all expenses in capital expenditure, bifurcation should be made as furniture, equipment, dead stock etc.
- 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with institutions, if any.

Major sources of instutional receipts are the following:

- State Government pays the salary to our permanent teaching and non-teaching faculty.
- UGC grants
- Research Projects
- University grants for various schemes and courses.



• Deogiri College manages to raise resources to meet its day-to-day expenses. UGC grants in the form of CPE, BSR and Career Oriented Programmes have helped in bringing about infrastructual and academic advancement. Management plays an important role in commencing new programmes and providing financial support to run the programmes.

The governing body manages the deficit by taking administrative decisions on each case. Deficit in granted courses is compensated by the surplus amount in nongrant courses.



# 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college is successful in securing additional funidng and it does come up with effective utilization of the additional resources. Following are the key areas where such additional grants are received:

IQAC further strengthens coordination, conceptualization and operationalization of the integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities of the institution based on the institutional policy on quality.

**Perspective Planning:** College has a Planning Committee that indulges in short term and long term planning regarding academic and administrative need based development. It ensures proper planning and execution of various programmes including infrastructural development.

**SWOC Analyses:** It is one of the important tools to identify need for quality enhancement. SWOC analyses is done on two level i.e. on departmental level and institution level.

**NAAC Guidelines:** The guidelines provided by NAAC on the seven criteria paves way for clarity in structuring integrated framework for quality assurance. It brings about a complete whole of necessary action plan for execution of effective teaching and learning experience. It also helps in deciding on the degree of significance of each aspect.

**ISO 9001: 2008 Guidelines:** Regular audit by ISO checks for regularities in quality issues on academic and administrative level. It also offers orientation of quality enhancement and thus helps in realizing quality experience regarding various academic and administrative activities.

**Online Accumulation of Academic Data:** A software designed by the Department of Computer Science has systematic way of accumulating academic information of all staff. It provides accumulated and processed information in order to realize the status of progress, its lacunas and need for enhancement in quality in certain areas. Yes, academic audit is done by institution from time to time. Every teacher is provided a academic diary at the beginning of the semester to keep track of academic activities. This diary is cross examined by the Principal. The results are analyzed by the Principal with the faculty. Steps are discussed to improve the results. There is a Teachers' Appraisal Committee that monitors academic



development of each faculty. Following are some of the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities.

- Need for basic research to promote scientific research attitude.
- Promoting teachers for institutional level research projects.
- Regularize the activities of MoUs

External review of the academic performance of teachers and administrative staff is done by ISO 9001: 2008 regularly. It also reviews the academic provisions available on the campus. The following are the suggestions made by ISO 9001: 2008 that helped in improvement of quality.

- Emphasis on interdisciplinary and interdepartmental programmes.
- Commencement of short term skill oriented programmes.

# 6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

Internal quality assurance mechanisms are aligned with the external quality assurance agency like ISO and NAAC. IQAC looks after all issues concerning quality both academic and administrative. IQAC provides necessary information in the meetings held with teaching, nonteaching, library staff, and management. IQAC keeps the pace with all necessary actions and programmes to be conducted within time framework so as to fulfill all the criteria of ISO certification and looks after fulfilling the suggestions by ISO.

IQAC vitally engages itself in the preparation of college on different 7 criteria in accordance with rules and regulations provided by NAAC Bangalore for subsequent assessment and accreditation. IQAC also implements various suggestions schemes given by UGC, New Delhi.

# 6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of itsstructure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

Academic calendar is prepared and detailed layout of the teaching plan is incoparted in the calender. The calender sets a time bound frame for completion of syllabus and revision by teachers. Students are also benefited by this academic calender. Head of department continously monitors the academic calender of respective faculty. Attendance is compulsory taken for every lecture. The tutorials & internal test are carried out. The answer paper are regularly assessed in time & the record of marks obtained by students is kept. From the performance of students, the students' level is judged by the staff & counseling is given to slow learners. Parents meetings are regularly held to brief parents about their child's performance.



### 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

Policies & plans regarding the quality assurance are communicated to the teaching & non-teaching staff through meetings, DCANET, college website, notices etc. The students are also made aware of such policies through various programmes. The external stakeholders are briefed about the policies through various platforms like Alumni Association, parent meet etc. Feedbacks are collected from these stakeholders & suggestions are incorporated in the policies. College prospectus and magazine consist of Vision and Mission statements, messages from the Secretary, the President and the Principal. It also provides institution quality policy, annual report, achievements & activities of the faculty & students in various fields. College website does provide necessary information indicating its quality assurance policies and its mechanism. Website is browsed by the stakeholders more often.



# **<u>CRITERION VII:</u> INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES**

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

#### 7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

- Yes, Deogiri College conducts Green Audit at the levels of energy conservation, water conservation, waste management and pollution control. Faculty and students from Department of Environmental Science and Geology undertook the audit.
- During the last four years, the Department of Geology, Botany, Zoology and Environmental Science actively contributed in spreading environmental awareness through the activities like 'No Vehicle Day', rainwater harvesting, artificial recharge, observation of World Water Day, waste water recycling, Eco Club, etc.
- College campus is 'plastic and tobacco free' and the campus and its surrounding area is declared as 'Silence Zone'.
- The units of NSS and NCC regularly undertake tree plantation program at college campus. Though the college has very little space to plant trees, it constantly attempts to take care of the eco-system like birds, trees and plants on the campus.
- Classrooms, laboratories, library, reading halls, offices, departments, hostels rooms and washrooms have sufficient ventilation and sunlight, which result in minimum use of electrical equipments like fans and lights.

#### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

#### • Energy Conservation

The college has a big number of electronic and electrical equipments such as computers, LCD projectors, tube lights, CFLs, etc. For efficient use of electricity, various means like notices, oral instructions and awareness programmes like Dnyanprabodhini are used so that the importance of conservation of energy would be inculcated among students and employees. The college makes use of energy-efficient Compact Fluorescent Lamps (CFL). Tube lights are being replaced by CFL and the number of them has reached 299 while the number of tube lights is 220. Besides it, the college has 34 solar panels for water heating at Girls' and Boys' hostels.

#### • Use of Renewable Energy :

The use of renewable energy like solar energy is done at college hostels. The details are as follows:

Besides the use of solar energy at college hostels, the college plans to make use of solar energy to light up the area around the college play ground where citizens of the city come to take morning and evening walk.

### Water Management:

### Initiatives taken for Minimizing the Use of Water: -

- 1) First we have identified areas where maximum use of water is done like Boys' and Girls' Hostels & watering the lawn on playground and infront of girls' hostels.
- 2) Disconnected direct supply of water to bathrooms in the hostels. Student will have to fetch water to bathroom from a tap outside the bathroom. It ensures the minimum use of water.
- 3) Everywhere press tabs are used to receive water & thus wastage of water is avoided.
- 4) For lawn, we use recycled water. Times like early morning and evening are sought to water the lawns in order prevent evaporation loss.
- 5) In every department laboratory, small tabs are used.

## **Rain Water Harvesting Project:**

The area in which Aurangabad is situated suffers from drought conditions frequently. As this region comes under shadow zone, it faces the problems of low rainfall. It average rainfall is only 700mm. The frequent conditions of scarcity of water compels for best management of available water. As a result, Rain Water Harvesting unit is established in the college.

The Rainwater Harvesting & Water Management programme in Deogiri College Campus is one of the ideal projects of Rainwater Harvesting in this region.

Deogiri College having total 12.5 hector i. e. 550000 sq. feet of land area; hence if there is average rainfall of 600mm, the total amount of harvested rainwater in groundwater is 33 million liter. In campus, we have divided rainwater harvesting scheme into two divisions.

• Roof water harvesting in particular building is carried out. Roof water is collected in horizontal pipes & all the pipes are connected to a large pipe (10 inch) that carries water to dugwell. On the days of high rainfall upto 90 to 100mm per day water is harvested in the the dugwell. The surplus water increases pressure due to which, water goes into rocks through cracks & joints present in subsurface rock. It is the reason that there is no overflow of rainwater from dugwell as subsurface rocks porosity is high so in this process,



all roof rainwater is directly percolated in subsurface of rocks. In this way, groundwater potential & water table of area are increased.

• Second method of harvesting is surface rainwater recharge. For this purpose we have divided total campus area into three parts depending upon slope of surface. According to this method, three recharge pits are constructed having size of 15x15x10 feet. They are filled with boulder at the bottom, metal upto 3 feet above and then large size of sand 3 feet making a filter bed. First pit is constructed near Dugwell in NW corner of campus in which surface water of Senior College Campus, Biotech Campus, Ladies Hostel & parking area is accumulated through subsurface drainage line. Second filter bed is constructed in south part of campus near Junior College gate. There is a borewell taken & around which filter bed of size 15x15x10 feet is constructed in which all Junior College surface area water is directed to. Third filter bed is made in SE corner of campus behind engineering workshop where water from the Engineering College is accumulated. In this way, the college saves 33 million liter water in college campus.


This is one of the best & idea Rainwater Harvesting plan in our region. Large no. of farmer, people, school boys & researcher also visit the college to see this plan. Due to this harvesting during drought year 2013, the two electric pumps of 7.5 HP & 5 HP were continuously yielding water from dugwell in summer when maximum dugwells in the region become dry.



## **Recycling of Water**:

• In girls' hostels of Deogiri College, there is accommodation facility for 600 girls. For domestic purpose, per head use of water is near about 150 liter. So total water requirement for domestic use in girls hostel per day is 600 X 150 liters (90,000 liters) and it is 27,00,000 liters for one month and yearly it is 32,40,0000 liters.

To recycle the used water used in the hostel, a separate pipeline is provided for waste water from bathroom. It accumulates in a filter bed constructed between the engineering building and the hostels with the size of 8 X 15 X 10 feet and it is filtered there. When water circulates through this filter bed by gravity at lower level all the filtered water is collected in another tank. This filtered water is reused for gardening and watering the lawns. With the help of this technique, we could save 43,20,000 liters every day. Following is a grphical view of the plant.



### **Purification of Water:**

• In Deogiri Campus every day, the daily requirement of water is 30000 liter for drinking purpose. Groundwater quality in our area is polluted, the percentage of pollution varies depending upon location of dugwell. To provide purified water to all staff member & students, a water purification plants near dugwell is established. It purifies 1500 litres of water per hour and it works for twelve hours per day thus providing 30000 liters of purified water to all staff, students & inmates of girls' & boys' hostels.

#### **Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:**

• The college takes all possible efforts to bring carbon neutrality. Ours is a zero carbon emission campus as we do not use refrigerators, air conditioners and other carbon emitting equipment beyond the permitted scale and point. Parking losts are located close to the entrance of the college. The carbon emissions tests are regularly conducted on vehicles of staff and students by the staff and students of Department of Environment Science. Also emission



test certificate is mandatory for the vehicles of college and staff. Plastic bags are strictly banned in the college campus and in canteen. Instead of plastic cups, we use paper cups and paper plates for tea and snacks. Cigarettes and tobacco products are strictly banned in the campus.

#### **Plantation:**

• To generate a culture of love for agriculture, the College takes initiative to engage students in cultivation of plantain, tapioca, elephant yam, colocasia etc in the vacant land under the auspicious of the NSS.

Following are the details about the vegetation:

College outsources the services to look after the lawns, shrubs, tress and plants on the campus. Besides this, NSS unit assigns duties to its volunteers to look after trees. Each volunteer is given the responsibility to look after a tree.

#### Hazardous waste management:

• The College does not offer courses using chemicals and compounds with high risk of intensity and side effects. Neither is the use of radio-active substances made. Therefore, the question of hazardous waste does not arise at all.

#### E- Waste management:

• Currently the College is in talk with the ICT equipments distributors to college regarding the management, disposal and recycling of e-waste at college campus. The quantity of the e-Waste is negligible.

#### 7.2 Innovations:

# 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years, which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

It has been the part of constant efforts by college to provide necessary facilities and well developed infrastructure as to bring about learning friendly ambience in the college campus. Keeping this in view, the college has introduced the following innovations



## INNOVATIONS IN ENVIRONMENT & HEALT CONSCIOUSNESS AWARENESS ACTIVITIES:

- Feeders and water pots are set in the premises of college campus for birds and it ha proved very helpful for birds to quench their thirst especially in summer. It is done by taking into consideration the large number of birds named common myna (*Acridotheres tristis*).
- The area in which Deogiri College is situated suffers from drought conditions frequently. Frequent conditions of scarcity of water compels for best management of available water. As a result, Rain Water Harvesting unit is in function in college harvesting 20000000 litre of water every year. It accumulates water in the well from Junior College Block, Library and Commerce Block. The water is also used to recharge the borewell on the campus. College has spent Rs. 5,96,279 to set up the unit.
- A Waste Water Treatment Plant for recycling of waste water is constructed on the area between girls' hostels and Biotechnology building. It has the capacity of **20,000 litres**. The water is mainly utilized for watering the lawns and trees.
- NSS unit organizes cleanliness programs for the Central Bus Station and Government Hospital. Three hundred volunteers take part in this activity every year. They not only clean the premises of the station and hospital but also undertake various activities in which they request passengers for clean and safer journey; they orient them on the importance of cleanliness & its advantages, etc.
- College hostels use solar panels for heating water and thus reduce pressure on electricity. There are 24 solar panels with total capacity of 19,000 litres used for water heating in Girls' and Boys' hostels. It has resulted in reducing the pressure on electricity usage.
- College has established a Health Centre with a regular doctor named Mrs Vaijayanti Damodar Bankar (Ubale). The doctor is available in the centre from 9.00am to 1.00 pm. She also makes visits to Girls' Hostel Sundays. Students from Girls'& Boys' hostels, teaching and non-teaching staff at college make use of the services.
- Yoga Teaching Camps held at the College campus have been effective and received overwhelming response. As a result, College has regularized the activity. Yoga Teaching Committee looks after the management of it.

#### **INNOVATIONS IN CURRICULAR & CO-CURRICULAR ASPECTS:**

- Central Research Laboratories for advanced scientific research has been enriched through the grants from UGC. Centrality does offer access to all the departments in the college. It is also proving helpful for the researchers from other colleges as well.
- Commencement of degree course like Bachelor of Vocation in Jewellery Designing & Gemology and Multimedia and Animation has been an outstanding academic innovation on the part of the college. The course approved by UGC bears the innovative features like academic flexibility where students have option to opt for career and it is not necessary to complete the course if the student desires to go for a job.
- A special centre named Apex Career Academy for the guidance of competitive exams, like MPSC, UPSC and banking. It offers guidance to the college students on MPSC, UPSC and Banking exams. It frequently arranges free seminars on various issues related to the exams at college.
- The Department of History and Geology have museums. The museum at the Dept. of History consists of unique and special pieces of artefacts and the museum at the Dept. of Geology has systematically preserved various specimens of gems, stones and rocks.
- In order to provide opportunities to students for learning at post graduation level in the subject of Mathematics and Geology, PGs in the subjects have been commenced. Besides it, Sanskrit is intorduced at UG level. This initiative has resulted in fulfilling the demand of many students.
- The college organized a special training event entitled Motivational Bridge Course in Mathematical Methods in Physics and Laboratory Practices. It was organized by the Department of Physics, Deogiri College for I and II year B.Sc students in association with Indian Association of Physics Teachers **RC-8** during 15<sup>th</sup> June to 9<sup>th</sup> July, 2011. It was sponsored by Indian Academy of Sciences (IAS), Bagalore, Indian Science Academy (INSA), New Delhi, National Academy of Sciences, India (NASI), Allahabad. Total 69 students were oriented by very renowned and outstanding scientists like Prof. Dr. Jayant V.Narlikar, Prof. Dr. S. Ananthakrishan, Prof. Dr. R. Nagrajan, Prof. Dr. P. N. Sen, Prof. Dr. R. N. Karekar, Prof. Dr. (Mrs) M. J. Narlikar, Prof. Dr. C. K. Desai, Prof. Dr. Shirish Pathare, Prof. Dr. Atul Modi, Prof. Dr. P. B. Patil, Prof. Dr. G. S. Raju, Prof. Dr. S. H. Behare, Prof. Dr. A. L. Chaudhari, Dr. Sunil S. Patil, Dr. S. D. Deshpade, Prin. V. H. Raybaghkar, Dr. S. M. Rampurkar, Dr. M. I. Iqubal and Dr. Ajay Mahajan. The issues like fundamentals of electromagnetism, Maxwell's equation, complex algebra and its application is Physics problems, functions, limits, delta functions, logical arguments, frame of references, inertial frame, Newton's equations, concepts of mass and force, Kepler's laws, electricity and magnetism, different methods of solution of differential equations, statistical mechanics, probability theory,



and probability distribution, thermodynamics, acoustics, optics, magnetism, etc were dealt by the resource persons with effective demonstration. This activity received wide acclaim in the region and student gave very positive feedback about activity. The management of the college also appreciated the efforts made by the college teachers.

• Centre for SARAL SANSKRIT EXAM organized by Sanskrit Bharati, New Delhi.

### **INNOVATIONS IN LIBRARY SERVICES:**

- A Central Library with e-journals and photocopy facility.

## **BEST PRACTICE: II**

#### **1.** Title of the Practice:

# Exhibition and Demonstration of Science Experiments for School Students

2. Goal:

The practice is a result of a disscussion that took place in a meeting between the teachers of primary and secondary school and the science teachers of the college in 2009-10. The teachers of the schools expressed the necessity of knowledge and information of advanced science experiments to school students in order to bring them idea how primary and basic knowledge of science subject is to be related and explored on a larger and more scientific manner. The need was also felt that the students of the school need to understand how it has become essential to understand and recognize the importance of concentrated and specialized studies. Students need to choose a subject to have thorough knowledge of. The visits to senior college and its fullfledged laboratories would offer them idea how there are opportunities to pursue one's research in specialized way. Besides making the ideas of students clear about what they wish to do in higher studies and what subject they want to pursue as their research interest, the visit also results in creating penchant for a particular subject they never have thought of or they got to study in their classes. For example, specializations like microbiology offer them idea of possibility of such specialized research and result in enlarging their horizons of possibilities and thinking capabilities.

With all these goals the practice was initiated. However following are the objectives the institutions wishes attempts to fulfill.

• Exporsure to school students to infrastructure of the college:

As the students of primary and secondary school remain unaware of possibilities for ideal infrastructure and possibilities of higher level of research to be undertaken assisted by rich environment made available on the college campus.

• Offering the students an experiecne of laboratories and research laboratories.

The college aims to bring the students actual experience of working out science experiments at college level. The experience of the students being in the laboratories of the colleges expecially that of research laboratories results in understanding the nature and culture of research available on the campus. They are enriched with the idea that they can initiate higher level of research and they can also associate the scientific knowledge they have with the higher level of research.



• Encouraging college students to make presenatations.

This event becomes doubly successful due to the active participation of college students in the demonstrations and experiments. Students of various science departments are encouraged to participate the event as volunteers and demonstrators.

• Variety of subjects and variety of experiments.

All science departments take part in the event and it helps students to receive knowledge of various streams in sciences. They move around the various laboratories including the Department of Mathematics where they get to see the demonstrations on the topics like 'Golden Ratio', Puzzles in Mathematics, 'Maths' Magic', etc.

#### • Theory in action.

The event is planned to provide the students practical knowledge of various theories and subjects in the field of science.

#### 3. The Context:

As it is mentioned above, the need for such activity was strongly felt and expressed by the teachers and headmasters of various Govt. and aided schools visiting to the college on the various occasions. It was mainly spoken out in a workshop held by the Department of Physics for school teachers. In the programmes organized by Departement of Psychology the need was also expressed by the teachers of schools under M.S.P. Mandal, Aurangabad. Since then, the Department of Psychology also takes part in the event.

#### • Bridging the Gap:

The event bridges the gap of knowledge of students. It prominantly helps in understanding the basic knowledge of the subject and its higher level of application. The practical use of knowledge they have strengthens students confidence in recognition, acquisition, retention and relevence of the knowledge and information.

#### • Reaching Out:

The institute is committed to reaching out to each section of the society and spread awareness about education and advanced knowledge. It observes its commitment to social cause as well. The present event proves very fruitful in order to reach out large number of students very meaningfully and create a bond of mutual understanding.

#### • Integrated learning:

The present activity has big context that of 'integrated learning' as proposed by the policy of higher education. Such type of learning ushers in the learners' better acquisition of the knowledge of various subjects. It correlates itself with extension activities of the institution.



#### 4. The Practice:

The event is organized with well formulated schedule which includes the proper planning, distribution of responsibilities, dissemination of information about the event among various stakeholders and schools in the city. The schedule and list of experiments and demonstrations is prepared. Students are assigned responsibilities to work as demonstrators in certain laboratories. They prepare themselves for such demonstrations and keep their sets ready for the day. The departments also assign duties to certain teachers to look after the whole process as coordinators.

Teachers of schools are contacted and the schedule of the event is communicated to them. Usually, the students of  $8^{th}$ ,  $9^{th}$  and  $10^{th}$  standard visit the college in majority. They are accompanied by their class teachers.

**Orientation Session:** The event starts with an orientation session that includes welcoming the students and teachers and providing them understanding about the event.

**Exhibition and Demonstration of Experiments and Helping the Studnets to Perform them:** The students who are working as demonstrators remain present in the respective laboratories and demonstrate the visiting students the experiments. They not only demonstrate and exhibite the science experiments but also help the students to perform the experiments.

**Inclusion of Experiments from the Curriculum of High School:** It is taken care of that the deomonstration and exhibition should include the experiments from the curriculum of the high school.

**Use of ICT Tools:** The departments make use of ICT tools like projectors. Students are shown the slide shows on various topics.

Students of various schools accompanied by their teachers visit the laboratories in groups. Usually there are as many groups as there are teachers available with them.




