Management i.e. Executive Council of M. S. P. Mandal Aurangabad to College Development Committee and thereafter from principal to vice principals, administrative heads, department heads, IOAC, incharge of different committees and cells and so on, there is technology assisted systems are specifically designed and functional in order to usher in the whole process of information dissemination and management. The department of Computer Science and IT has developed a local interface based on LAN called DCANET that is mainly designed to record, manage and perform administrative and academic activities. Information Dissemination through DCANET: It is a dynamic interface that allows Principal, Vice Principals, Office Superintendent, Registrar, Clerks and Heads of Departments log in. This facilitates the direct communication among these unit through paperless modes and it has a deal of time management. Staff Portal: This is an interactive portal that provides teachers, HoDs and incharge, coordinators and chairman of different academic committees and cells to upload information. Through this personal and academic information of teachers is collected effectively. Teachers and HoDs can monitor the progress through this. Teaching plan management is also done through the interface. Teachers can update their information on DCANet and centrally all data can be fetched and segregated as per requirement. HoDs can upload data regarding departmental activities and the same access for data upload is provided to the incharge of services. Paperless Correspondence System: All circulars and notices are scanned and signed digitally as to process them towards the desired end. The notices and circulars are made available on the gateway on DCANET entitled as Notices. All documents that are 'inwarded' and 'outwarded' are scanned and preserved. Besides the paper saving, it saves time and works efficiently. Learning Management: Students provided with the access for online resources along with data base created and available on college website and college library website. Students are also made available with online lecture in the form of package from NPTEL. That allows online learning management. Along with this, account and store of the college, makes use of software like Tally to management information related to their department. This helps in managing their data and work efficiently. Library of the college has LIBMAN, OCR, NVDA - Low

Vision software for visually challenged students in association with Snehankit Mumbai from whom we receive book turned into Braille. For admission online systems are adopted including that of fees collection/submission and exam related functions. MKCL is a system that is adopted for the admission process as it interfaced with the affiliating university.

It is being executed through DCA-NET i.e. intranet service with the coordination of Department of Computer Science and IT. Well in advance, the prescribed curriculum with recommended reading and bibliographical resources, supporting study materials, time table, question patterns and related data is being uploaded. At the very commencement of the academic year, well prepared and logically planned academic calendar is being circulated to all the concerned stakeholders for the proper and systematic execution of the prescribed curriculum. All the minute details related to the teaching, learning and evaluation and research as well as curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities are mentioned in the said academic calendar. As per the guidelines of the academic calendar, each faculty member prepares an individual teaching-learning plan giving proper and balanced justice to whole curriculum. Such teaching-learning plans are being uploaded on DCA-NET for easy access to all the concerned stakeholders. Regular and academic and administrative meetings are being conducted time and again to verify, stimulate and execute the actual curriculum planning and its proper implementation. All the faculty members of each department actively participate in the regular department meetings exclusively devoted to curriculum planning and implementation. Critical survey is being taken with proper stimulation through such meetings. And syllabus completion report being sought from the individual teacher at the end of each semester. Essential recommendation and readings, bibliographical and webliographical resources and well prepared study materials and time and again are being shared to the students for the effective implementation of the syllabus for better performance in exams and as the best assets for their capacity building programs. Various innovative and student friendly teaching-learning methods and synergetic critical perspectives are being used to enrich the prescribed curriculum with expected

positive results. In order to add more value, essential and expected par excellence objectives to explore and execute, contours and nuances of the curriculum, program outcomes, course outcomes and specific program outcomes are being prepared well in advance and communicated to the students. By using various innovative audio-video aids, language laboratory, science laboratories, research laboratories, ICT enabled classrooms, mechanism of curriculum planning and execution being made more strong for promising performance for both teachers and students as well. 1.4.2 - How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of th	e institution? (maximum 500 words)						

Feedback Obtained

The institute has a regular practice of feedback collection, critical analysis and proper utilization for overall development of the institute. Feedback from students, parents, alumni, and employers is being collected in a stipulated format both offline and online by using a sample method. In a meeting of IQAC the collected data being studied thoroughly with proper division, analysis, interpretation, evaluation and critical appreciation. Most probable and tenable solutions are being explored and executed on the negative responses. Teaching-learning methodologies are being moulded as per the response of advanced, middle and low learners. As per the response, a few essential certificate and diploma courses, skill oriented and bridge courses are being planned to bridge the gap and for more value addition in the regular curriculum. Deliberate attempts are continuously made to maintain the positive opinions and living faith of the students in the systems of the college. The responses of the students who stated that the structure of syllabus was excellent and the curriculum had applications to the real life situations being re-examined in the IQAC meetings. Even the opinions of the students who gave negative response such as the curriculum was average and below average are being well respected with proper antidotes and panacea. Employers: As per the thorough analysis of employers a good weightage was given to skill development, communication skill development, Incorporation of components of leadership abilities and importance to learning values to bridge the gap between campus and industry, academia and corporate world. Campus interviews are being arranged regularly to make the mutual bond stronger and thus opportunities of employment are being regularly provided to the aspiring students. A few bridge courses are also initiated as per the said response as a solution to the cardinal issues like poor communication in English, and low confidence, entrepreneurship skills and personality development programs. Parents' responses and feedback are being thoroughly studied in an IQAC meeting. The suggestions given by them through the feedback are deeply considered positively. As per their response a healthy

campus with rich environment is being maintained. Bibliographical and webliographical resources are being added every year as per the suggestions. A certificate course exclusively devoted to values and ethics is planned in the nearest future as per the feedback of the parents. Alumni's feedback was also discussed in an independent meeting taking into consideration its rich experience. Few lacunas suggested by alumni were discussed with suitable solution. The collected feedback with all its critical analysis is uploaded on the college website for common access, consideration and suitable suggestions. By and large, following action is taken on the overall collected feedback: 1. Awareness about the analysis of the feedback is spread. 2. The feedback is placed in CDC meeting. 3. For improvement of curriculum HoDs of different departments have sent suggestive measures to respective BoS. 4. Teachers are encouraged to take more efforts as to fill the gaps found in the analysis. 5. Stress is given more on improvement of infrastructure and use of ICT in teaching-learning.

2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The formal teaching learning process requires more efforts to solve different problems of learners. It must be assisted by personal counselling and exchange of ideas on various personal levels between students and teachers. Keeping this in mind, the college has developed a mechanism called student mentoring system. Students studying a particular subject register themselves with the teacher teaching the concerned subject. The teachers offer all kinds of assistance for the mentees. Students mainly seek help on academic matter. It has proved very helpful in case of girl students and results into continuity and improvement in teaching-learning process. Deogiri College takes proper care in providing learning on campus opportunities to its staff. It results positively in various academic and administrative areas like knowledge sharing, teaching, learning, mentoring, research, sports, extension, and participation in conference, seminars, campus placement, and infrastructural development. Faculties guide, motivate and support student lagging behind in academic performance. Personal guidance of the concerned subject teachers is provided to students in need of it. Students are given concession in hostel fees by management. It helps in ensuring their presence in the campus. Remedial coaching in the beginning of the academic year also results positively. Every department has Student Mentoring programme. Students are divided among the available faculty in the department. Students seek guidance and counselling as when required from their mentors. This activity helps students to express their ideas and share their problems with their teachers on various personal issues. Through Dept. Of Commerce campus interviews were organized for all students not only for Deogiri college but for whole city and large number of opportunities made available for last 25 years. Students

Mentoring Programmes are regularly conducted every year for the students. Personality and Soft Skill Development Programmes are being conducted every year for overall development of the students. College has regularized remedial coaching and bridge courses as a part of necessity. The departments identify the slow learners and analyze the reasons of problems in learning of them. Accordingly, they are given remedial coaching. Student mentoring programmes proves helpful in this regard. The following are some of the departments offering remedial coaching. Besides the regular bridge courses in various subjects, the college also hosts special bridge courses in association with prominent institutes and associations. The college organized such event entitled Motivational Bridge Course in Mathematical Methods in Physics and Laboratory Practices. Industrial visits are arranged to different industries/business houses, trade fairs, institutes of higher learning centres. Departments organize study tours and industrial visits which enables the students to get first-hand experience. Interactive sessions with chartered accountant, entrepreneurs, and professionals are organized to motivate the students for starting new ventures.

the students along with the scheme of marking. Students are clearly, transparently and regularly evaluated on the basis of internal tests scheduled during the preparation of academic calendar and group discussions. Evaluation of the internal / unit tests and papers of internal examination is done immediately after the submission of papers. Marks of tutorials, unit tests and internal examination are considered for evaluating the performance of student. At the beginning of the academic year, teachers explain the students the evaluation methods framed by the University such as question paper pattern, practical examination pattern and scheme of marking. College Website, LCD display, circulars disseminates information and guidelines regarding the examination schedule. Evaluation of teachers Teachers are evaluated on the basis of their annual Performance Based Self-Appraisals (PBSA) which are collected at the end of academic years. Student's feedbacks are also collected by the college for improving the quality of teaching-learning process in terms of Students feedback on teachers. Data is collected and analysed by the Feedback Analysis Committee in consultation with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell, faculties with good feedback are appreciated and if necessary IQAC provides consultations with the concerned faculty for improving their teaching skills. Suggestions obtained from students are shared with all the teachers which assist the teachers to introspect and improve their teaching skills. The faculty members are made aware of the recent updates of the evaluation process through human resource enrichment workshops organized by our parent institution. Evaluation of the college College yearly conducts ISO audit which helps in enhancing the professional development of teaching staff. Interaction of the staff with the team of ISO auditors results in introduction to new and innovative ways of teaching-learning process and systematic monitoring of the same. College conducts feedback survey on infrastructure facilities in the campus which helps to improve an extent the existing facilities at institutional level.

2.5.3 - Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Preparation of academic calendar: The college constitutes a committee comprising of members from planning forum IQAC, administration and student representative. The calendar is prepared prior to the commencement of academic year, specifying available dates for activities to be completed to ensure proper teaching-learning transaction and continuous evaluation. It is prepared by considering the academic calendar of our affiliating university, public holidays, national, religious festivals and schedule of examinations. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell plans for next year's activities in consultation with the Principal and Local Governing Council of the College. Contents of Calendar It includes the admission period, effective teaching period, Course commencement Dates, Closing dates, Schedule of Internal and university examinations, significant co-curricular and extracurricular activities, annual day dates of academic and administrative bodies,

celebration of important days NSS / NCC camps etc. The college follows academic calendar of events (course-wise and subject wise for UG and PG courses) based on requirement, feedback and academic planning. Preparation and execution of teaching plan: Departmental meetings are held at the beginning of the academic year to assign workload to individual teachers. Syllabi of the different classes are discussed in detail. All the teachers prepare week / month wise teaching plans and execute accordingly throughout the academic year. Teaching plan is prepared on the basis of following factors: The total quantum of the syllabus to be taught Workable distribution of the total syllabus into convenient teaching units Equitable proportion of teaching units and teaching dates Availability of required teaching aids Schedule of internal as well as external evaluation Teaching units to be covered Teaching plans are submitted to the IQAC cell. All teachers scrupulously stick to their teaching plan in the completion of the syllabus, much before the commencement of the examination. Teachers also prepare online teaching diaries. Academic electronic diary: The teachers have to maintain the Academic Diary wherein period-wise academic delivery has to be mentioned which is monitored by the Head of Department and Principal.
